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Planning RV Travel

Campground reservations are strongly recommended during the summer season, May to September, and especially on weekends. Tour through Ontario with a recommended minimum time of 2 weeks, or extend your holiday to include a trip across the country. It is approximately 2,000 Kilometres of winding highway from Toronto to the Manitoba border. Add another 300 km or so for getting into campgrounds, shopping, sightseeing and of course, back tracking to investigate animals and attractions along the road. Stock up on essentials at a big-box store or supermarket. We recommend purchasing a small barbeque and a small gas canister for outdoor dinners along the way.



RV RENTAL STATIONS

Pearson International Airport serves as the gateway to RV rental stations around Toronto. Overseas visitors are required to spend at least one night in a hotel upon arrival. Many visitors will spend several days sightseeing and shopping in the city after drop-off.

Round trips from Southern Ontario hubs may range from a few hundred to a few thousand kilometers. Nine RV touring routes encompass all the regions in the province.

One way rentals are offered between Toronto, Montreal, Halifax in the east, and Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver and Whitehorse in the west. Trip planning and early booking is recommended.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Union Pearson Express runs between Pearson International Airport and Union Station in downtown.

The GO Train regional transit service runs to suburban communities and cities in the Golden Horseshoe Region along the lakeshore as far west as Kitchener, north to Barrie, and south to Niagara Falls.

Tour the city aboard the hop-on, hop-off bus service or street cars through the city centre.

ATTRACTIONS

Toronto is marked most noticeably by the iconic CN Tower with panoramic views all around.

Ontario Science Museum, Royal Ontario Museum, and Ripley's Aquarium are close to the Lake Ontario waterfront with casual walks and dinner cruises.

Historic sites include Fort York, Osgoode Hall and Casa Loma. The Royal Ontario Museum has forty galleries focusing on natural history and world culture.

The city is a mecca for shopping at Kensington and St. Lawrence Markets, Queen St. West, Bloor St., and the Toronto Distillery District. The city offers an extremely diverse food scene from casual to fine dining.

Queens' Park includes the Provincial Legislature Building and the old Toronto City Hall.

Toronto is the home of the world champions Raptors basketball and Blue Jays baseball. Argonauts play in the Canadian Football League. The NHL Hockey Hall of Fame is home to the Stanley Cup, one of the world's oldest sport trophies. League play for the Maple Leafs runs between September and April.

Vaughn hosts Canada's Wonderland that has the world's tallest, longest and fastest dive coaster.

This RV route runs eastward on Hwy#7 from Port Severn on Georgian Bay, through cottage country to Ottawa, down the Ottawa River Valley, back on Hwy#2 along the north shore of Lake Ontario to the intersection with Hwy#400 north of Toronto. There are many deviations and side trips to campgrounds and points of interest along the way.

EASTBOUND ROUTE

PORT SEVERN / OTTAWA / CORNWALL

Port Severn to Cornwall. Starting at Port Severn on Georgian Bay, the eastbound route cuts across cottage country and lake shores lined with vacation homes. Orillia, Lindsay, Peterborough and Perth located on the Trent Waterway, make up a string of historic towns on the fringe of the Canadian Shield. Continue to the nation's capital in Ottawa, and then southeastward along the Ottawa River through Franco-Canadian country on the Quebec border. The route intercepts the St. Lawrence River at Cornwall. Highlights include the Trent-Severn Waterway, the Rideau Canal and the St. Lawrence Seaway.

** WESTBOUND ROUTE

CORNWALL / OSHAWA / GUELPH

Cornwall to Guelph. The westbound portion of the RV touring route between Cornwall and Oshawa features the lowlands along the St. Lawrence Seaway that run through Morrisburg, Iroquois, Prescott, Brockville, Gananoque and Kingston. Highlights include Parks of the St. Lawrence and Upper Canada Village.

The westbound route intercepts the Rideau Canal and the Trent Waterway at several points before heading north of Toronto to Guelph.



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TRENT-SEVERN WATERWAY*

This historic waterway traverses South Eastern Ontario's cottage country. The 400-km-long lake and canal system joins together the Trent River, Otonabee River and Kawartha Lakes, Lake Simcoe and Lake Couchiching between Port Severn on Georgian Bay and Trenton on the Bay of Quinte. The Trent-Severn is one of Ontario's major recreational waterways that contains 45 locks, 39 swing bridges, and 160 dams and control structures. Originally a commercial transportation system, the Trent-Severn Waterway is administered by Parks Canada.

The Waterway winds through towns, sleepy villages, and countless historic stops on the South Eastern segment of this touring route in Ontario. Canals and locks raise and lower water levels for the passage of vessels between the rugged Canadian Shield in the north and the lowlands lying north along the shores of Lake Ontario.

DAY ONE

Port Severn to Fenelon Falls

Port Severn. The start of the Trent-Severn Waterway. The Big Chute Marine Railway has a lift of 18 m that removes boats from the water and carries the vessels in individual cradles between the Severn River to be refloated on to Georgian Bay. Picnic areas and scenic viewpoints are located alongside the locks.

- Orillia. Known as "Mariposa" in Stephen Leacock's 1912 fictional novel. Take a tour of Stephen Leacock's home at the Leacock Museum National Historic site*. Hometown of singer Gordon Lightfoot who composed the tragic story of the sinking of the ore-carrier Edmund Fitzgerald during a gale on Lake Superior. Couchiching Beach Park features a town dock and sandy beaches along the shores of Lake Couchiching. Located next to the park is French's Hot Dog Stand, which opened in 1920 and still operates. It is a summer tradition for repeat visitors and park goers.
- Kirkfield Lift Lock* has a lift lock located at the highest elevation of the Trent waterway. The massive hydraulic lift Lock 36 is designated in the order of numbering of locks starting from Trenton on Lake Ontario. A self-guided tour explains the operations. It serves as a tourist attraction for its unusual engineering that allows boats to be lifted high into the air. Boaters are the only users of the Trent waterway.



COTTAGE COUNTRY

Cottage Country is a general urbanite term for summer hot spots in the Muskokas' between the Kawartha Lakes to the Haliburton Highlands along the Trent Severn Waterway. Beach front cottages are being rebuilt into elaborate permanent homes, causing land values to soar.

Kawartha Lakes is a large area with many lakes strung out along the southern fringe of the rocky Canadian Shield. Charming towns and villages including Fenelon Falls, Kirkfield and Lindsay lie along parts of the Trans Canada Trail.

House boating is a favorite pastime. Egan Houseboat Rentals has the largest fleet in Ontario. Local farmer markets are held in Bobcaygeon, Fenelon Falls, Lindsay, Peterborough, Buckhorn and other small towns along the Trent-Severn Trail.

• Fenelon Falls. Lock 34 is surrounded by flower gardens provided by the Fenelon Falls Horticultural Society. James Wallis' Maryboro Lodge* commemorates extensive land settlement and the donation of his land for the community's first church in 1835.

- Lindsay. Olde Gaol Museum and Heritage Centre. Old Mill Park is located right next to Lock 33. The shining spire on St. Paul's Anglican Church stands in stark contrast to the barbed wire fence surrounding the nearby Central East Correctional Institute.
- Peterborough is the location of hydraulic Lift Lock 21* It is another masterpiece of engineering of hydraulic lift chambers on the Trent waterway built between 1896 and 1904. Peterborough Museum and Archives features early settlement and the manufacturing industries that include street cars made by Canadian General Electric in 1899. It was the first city to have electric street lights. Housing took on many forms including Cox Terrace row houses*, workers homes and so-called developer homes as examples of residential housing built during the Second Empire. Second Empire refers to a popular 1850s style of mansions, reflecting a French influence from the Napoleonic era and seen throughout Southern Ontario. The distinctive mansard roof and elaborate ornamentals would distinguish the political and economic stature of the owners.



Explore the historic influence of canoe travel at the Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough, with canoes stemming from the fur trade used to carry 80lb bales of beaver pelts down the waterways to Montreal. Three "Royal Canoes" on display were offered as gifts to the Royal Family.

Kawartha Trails Resort. Peterborough. Otonabee River on Trent-Severn Waterway. One hour southeast of Fenelon Falls. Services: Electrical and water hookups. Sani-dump. Toilets/showers. Boat launch. Wifi.



Emily Provincial Park. Situated on Pigeon Lake. Peterborough. Services: Flush toilets/showers, in Hill and Circle Campgrounds. Laundromat. Canoe rentals.











Travel from Peterborough to Smiths Falls

Follow Hwy#7 through Perth, Smiths Falls towards Carleton Place and the outskirts of Ottawa.

- **Sharbot Lake.** A small lake front village with a notable rail history including a caboose and railroad signals.
- Perth was founded in 1816 on the Tay River as part of defense strategy which protected the passage way on the Rideau Canal between Ottawa and Fort Henry in Kingston.

The Tay Canal link to the Rideau Canal is connected by five wooden locks built by an enterprising group of private investors to ensure Perth's participation in the commercial trade in Upper Canada. Visit the Heritage Conservation District with streets lined with some of the finest, well-preserved stone buildings from the 1830-1850s. McMartin House* is a dedicated marker for the Loyalist elites.

- The Mammoth Cheese exhibit is a full-size replica of a 10,000 kg cheese block in downtown Perth that was made to promote Canadian cheese around the world. Twelve cheese makers from Lanark County donated a day's supply of milk from 10,000 cows to the project. The big cheese garnered extraordinary publicity at the Chicago world's fair when its weight caused it to crash through the floor of the exhibition hall.
- Port Elmsley. A rural village sits among many others on the Rideau waterway as it winds between Perth and Smiths Falls.
 The still functioning drive-in theatre is listed as a place of interest. The area typifies the granting of large blocks of crown land to Americans who defected north during the Revolutionary War. A driving tour provides a routing to notable mansions and landmarks.
- Smiths Falls. Rideau Canal Visitor Centre and Museum
 is located in a 19th Century stone mill building with an
 observation room on the top floor. The Railway Museum of
 Eastern Ontario is housed in the old CPR station. In 1964,
 the RCA Victor Plant pressed the first Beatle album in North
 America. The single span Bascule Railway Bridge* lifts by
 counter weights to allow clearance for boats to pass. It works
 on the same principle as the Tower of London draw bridge.

Wheelers' Pancake House and Sugar Camp is famous for fluffy pancakes and maple syrup flavored sausage. Located off Hwy#36 on Highland Line Road.

OWL Rafting offers a legendary 12 km splash and roll ride through the white water rapids of the notorious Rocher Fendu. Six RV sites with hookups on site. Located off Hwy#17 at Cobden towards Arnprior.

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RIDEAU CANAL*

The Rideau Canal is North America's best-preserved slack water canal and a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Its entire length between Kingston and Ottawa comes under Parks Canada operations. The connected lakes allow for canoeing, kayaking, fishing and house boating through the rocky wilderness. The RV tour intercepts the Rideau Canal sites at intervals along the route.

4 DAY FOUR

Travel from Smiths Falls to Ottawa.

Camp close to Ottawa to spend a minimum of 2 days in the nation's Capital.

• Ottawa. Parliament Hill is home to Canada's federal government. The city centre has many government and historic aspects including the Senate of Canada, Supreme Court of Canada, National Gallery of Canada, National Arts Centre, Bank of Canada Museum, and the Fairmont Chateau Laurier Hotel. Nearby lie the Library & Archives of Canada and Canadian War Museum. The Changing of the Guard ceremony takes place in front of Parliament Hill. The Canadian Armed Forces posts sentries on-site at the National War Memorial daily from spring to fall. Stroll along Sparks Street with architecture that goes back

Hand cranks operate the eight locks of the Rideau Canal* where it joins the Ottawa River. The canal offers recreational boaters 200 km of navigation on the waterway between Ottawa and Kingston on Lake Ontario.

Nepean Point offers views of the Ottawa skyline and Alexandra Bridge across the Ottawa River to Gatineau on the Quebec side. The Canada Aviation & Space Museum is located at the Rockcliffe Airport. The RCMP horse farm breeds the finest Hanoverian horses in Canada for the RCMP Musical Ride. Daily tours are available.



Spend an extra day in the nation's capital.

Spend an extra day to explore the art, architecture, history and heritage in the nation's capital and French culture in Gatineau, Quebec.

- Gatineau. Visit the Canadian Museum of History and Chaudiere Falls.
 There are 183 km of summer hiking trails in the Gatineau Hills located in the Outaouais Region of Quebec. Champlain Lookout is on a granite ridge at the top of Eardley Escarpment, 300 m above the Ottawa Valley.
- Mackenzie King Estate (Gatineau Park). Once the summer home of Canada's longest-serving prime minister, this 231-hectare (571 acre) property in Gatineau Park welcomes visitors to enjoy lunch, special activities, lush gardens and wooded trails. Explore the picturesque architectural ruins that King collected and reconstructed here.

PRESCOTT-RUSSELL COUNTY

Follow the Ottawa Valley through farmlands to the Franco-Ontarian region strong in language and culture along the Quebec border to the southeast. The Broue & Chew route heads from Rockland through Alfred, L'Original, Vankleek Hill, Hawkesbury and numerous quaint farming villages.

- Prescott-Russell Villages. Limoges has the Calypso Waterpark featuring the largest wave pool in Canada.
 The Bog Walk boardwalk in Alfred covers 180 km of trails.
- Vankleek Hill is a quaint village known as the "Gingerbread Capital of Ontario". The porches, windows and gables on over two hundred homes feature intricate gingerbread architectural designs. Millwork for the Victorian and Edwardian homes was ordered from catalogues. The South Eastern corner of Ontario features an unusual art exhibit on a self-guided driving tour. Some highly visible grain silos loom into view in the rural area on Hwy#417. Known as *Popsilos*, the farms display giant murals that average 65 ft high and cost \$40,000 each to paint.

 Hawkesbury. A largely French-speaking area alongside the Quebec border lying half-way between Ottawa and Montreal. This prominent agricultural area grows a large variety of vegetable and berry crops.

Cornwall and the Counties includes the amalgamation of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, referred to as SDG.

- Ontario Travel Information Centre. An Ontario Travel Information Centre is located on Hwy#417 close to the interprovincial border with Quebec.
- Point-Fortune, Macdonnell-Williamson House*, built in 1819, is located on the banks of the Ottawa River below the dam and power house at Carillon Rapids. It was designated a National Historic site by Parks Canada as the finest of several rubble-stone houses built in the area by retired North West Company fur trading partners.
- **2** Waterfront Campsite on the St. Lawrence River / Gord Rees

with Gaelic the common language in the region. Immigration was originally made up of Scottish emigrants from the Scottish Highlands. Sixty points of interest are included in the North and South Glengarry circuits. Williamstown boasts of St. Andrew's Church* dating back to 1787, with the present church rebuilt in 1802. Be sure to visit the Vankleek Hill Museum and Glengarry Pioneer Museum on County Road#24 in Dunvegan.

• Glengarry County stretching north of Hwy#401, is Ontario's Celtic

Heartland. It has been asserted that Glengarry was its own nation

- Historic stone ruins of the St. Raphael Cathedral* north of Williamstown looks more like it could be resurrected from Rome. It once served as the administrative centre for the Catholic Church in Upper Canada.
- Cornwall, Ontario's most easterly city was settled by an influx of Empire Loyalists from the Thirteen Colonies in 1784, combined with a mix of French Canadian and Acadian migrants. The town figured prominently as an industrial centre along the St. Lawrence River. The Historic SDG Jail was decommissioned in 2002, and now offers seasonal tours and paranormal experiences. A particular characteristic of Eastern Ontario was the work "bee" named as such for the communal efforts for collective projects, or for helping individual families.





This portion of the RV touring route between Cornwall and Belleville features the great waterways of South Eastern Ontario which run through Morrisburg, Iroquois, Prescott, Brockville, Gananoque and Kingston. Highlights include Parks of the St. Lawrence

7 DAY SEVEN

Travel from Cornwall to Prescott.

• Parks of the St. Lawrence includes three campgrounds on the islands and five more on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. Woodlands, Mille Roches and McLaren are connected by the Long Sault Parkway. Farran Point, Glengarry, Upper Canada, Riverside, Ivy Lea and Riverside-Cedar stretch along Hwy#401. Long Sault Campgrounds are operated by the St. Lawrence Parks Commission. Numerous





- Long Sault Parkway lying between Long Sault to the east, and Ingleside to the west, is a series of 11 scenic islands that stretch 10 kilometers between high points of land created by flooding of the St. Lawrence Seaway.
- Upper Canada Village*. Go back in time to the 1860s by strolling with a guide through the largest living-history site in Canada. Explore authentic buildings that were relocated from nine Lost Villages during the permanent flooding of the St. Lawrence Seaway Project in 1958. The set replicates an English Canadian village with blacksmith, bakery, printing office, sawmill, and a hand-pumper fire engine. The assembly of homes with period furniture and antique wood stoves depict the lifestyle of a prosperous middle class merchant family, a farm house, and hired hand's log cabin.

"Farran's Point" is typical of the small sunken villages of the St. Lawrence Seaway. The area was settled when large land grants were offered in payment for loyal service to the British Crown. United Empire Loyalists moved north after the American War of Independence in 1784. The living museum is located in Morrisburg, just east of Long Sault.

The Battle of Crysler's Farm.* sits above the battleground near Upper Canada Village east of Morrisburg, where the British encampment marks one of the most decisive battles to defeat the American forces in the War of 1812. The site is marked by replica iron tents and soldiers with muskets in very noticeable red and white uniforms.

- **Iroquois.** One of the few close-up views of the locks to see lakers and ocean freighters transiting the bi-national St. Lawrence Seaway. Seven locks raise vessels 246 ft above sea level between the Atlantic Ocean and Lake Ontario. The 766-foot chamber on each lock fills 91 million liters in ten minutes which allows a ship passage through each lock in about 45 minutes.
- **Prescott.** Fort Wellington* represents one of the best preserved 19th century fortifications along the St. Lawrence River. It is famous for the nearby site of the **Battle of the** Windmill* in 1838 during the Upper Canada Rebellion where Loyalists defeated an invasion of insurgents from the States. Visit the Downtown historic area with wall plaques that explains the history and events during early settlement. The Prescott to Bytown railroad became part the CNR rail network in later years.

B DAY EIGHT

Prescott to Kingston through the Thousand Islands.

The St. Lawrence River has long been a conduit for smuggling pirate loot, gold and alcohol between neighbouring countries.

- Ogdensburg-Prescott International Bridge is made up of six suspension bridge connections. It is also known as the St. Lawrence Bridge and the Seaway Skyway that crosses the St. Lawrence River on Hwy#416.
- Brockville is known as the City of the 1000 Islands. Stroll through the 1439foot Railway Tunnel*, the first to be built in Canada and designed to provide railway access to the waterfront. This transformed pedestrian tunnel running underneath the city presents a brilliant display of rock cuts and stalactites illuminated by LED lighting. River boat tours are offered as a choice of highspeed adventure on the "Wildcat", or the finely appointed "Lady of the Isles". Choose from numerous 1 or 3 hour boat cruises, or a Sunset Dinner Cruise.

- The neoclassical Court House and Gaol* located in the Historic Area of Brockville has a 3.5 m statue of Sally Parker mounted on the pinnacle as an anonymous symbol of Justice and was one of the first law courts in Upper Canada. The gardens facing Court House Square provide a vista and a statue of Major General Sir Isaac Brock, a British officer who was celebrated for his military victory against American forces at Fort Detroit, and in the Niagara Peninsula where he was shot and killed during the early days of the border war.
- Thousand Island Parkway begins just west of Brockville, near Butternut Bay. It extends westerly for about 40 km to Gananoque.
- Thousand Islands National Park. A historic wilderness park featuring picturesque granite islands and windswept pine trees along the shores of the St. Lawrence River. Paddlers can explore secluded bays and channels of the Thousand Islands. Hiking trails offer the opportunity to observe rare species of turtles and birds.
- Thousand Islands International Bridge is a system of five arched bridges spanning the St. Lawrence River to New York State. It serves as an entry of American visitors arriving near Ivy Lea west of Rockport on Hwy#137 to #401. Built during the Great Depression, it stands as a symbol of lasting friendship and peace between two northern neighbors.
- Mallorytown was founded by the United Empire Loyalists in 1784. The village became the site of Canada's first glassworks factory. Thousand Island Boat Museum, London Bay lookout and interpretive centre are located in Mallory Landing.

- **Rockport.** Two prominent castles on the U.S. side are accessed by Rockport Cruises. Passports are required for landing. The Boldt Castle on Hearth Island belies the fate of a distressed owner whose wife died before completion. Singer Castle, known to have mysterious hidden doors and secret buttons concealing rooms and chambers, is a part time residence for the family of the sewing machine empire.
- Gananoque is a gateway to the 1000 Islands, with twenty islands concentrated along a stretch of the St. Lawrence River. The town, located at the western end of the Thousand Island Parkway, is the birthplace of *Thousand Island Dressing*!

The eastern extremity of Lake Ontario is packed by a chain of islands where the lake drains into the St. Lawrence River and hence gives rise to the elaborate lock system on the St. Lawrence Seaway. Vacation homes on many of the "1000 islands" are inhabited during the summer months.



BAY OF QUINTE

Bay of Quinte is just east of the head of the St. Lawrence River. Quinte is also a region situated along the Bay that encompasses Napanee, Belleville, Brighton and Trenton.

9 DAY NINE

Travel through Kingston to Belleville.

Kingston. One of Ontario's most eminent cities for early Canadian history. Kingston City Hall* commands the downtown waterfront. Fort Henry* is part of Ontario's UNESCO World Heritage Centre where there are four Martello Towers visible on the river islands. The distinctive design featured round walls that would deflect cannon balls when under attack.

Tourism attractions include the downtown waterfront, city hall, Queens' University, Bellevue House and a tour of the Kingston "Pen"* where notorious Canadian serial killers were housed behind concrete walls in maximum segregation units until its closure in 2013.

Sir John A. Macdonald was the chief architect of Confederation which led to the creation of the Dominion of Canada on July 1st, 1867. As the new country's first prime minister, his government completed the transcontinental railway and opened the West for development. He also created a national police force known as the North-West Mounted Police that later became the RCMP. He named **Bellevue*** as his country estate.

Kingston Mills* is the beginning of the 202 km Rideau waterway built 160 years ago to protect Canada's capital from American invasion. The Rideau Canal Waterway* became a UNESCO World Heritage site marking the 49 sets of locks on the route. The canal traces routes for exploration, defense, commerce and transportation that helped shape Canadian development. Stop at picnic areas to view yachts passing through the locks.

10 Oshawa (11) Guelph

- Adolphustown is located on one of the oldest colonial roads in Ontario. Eastern terminus of Glenora ferry, a free crossing that departs every 15 minutes, and links up with the Loyalist Parkway to Picton. UEL monument marks the spot of the first landing of the Loyalists in 1784.
- · Prince Edward County. Take the island route noted for wine, cheese and cider or beer tastings. The agricultural area has more than forty estate wineries. Pinot Noir and chardonnay are most common grape varieties. The county has a number of quaint loyalist towns such as Wellington and Bloomfeld, with charming architecture, farm markets and antique stores.



• Picton and the surrounding area are known for strong Loyalist heritage. The Naval Marine Archives hold an extensive collection of mercantile marine, navies and displays of Great Lakes' history. It serves lakers as a deep water port.

Belleville, located on the Bay of Quinte, hosts numerous distinctive historic stone buildings in various architectural styles from the 1850s including City Hall* representative of Victorian High Gothic style. Glanmore House*, built in 1883 by a wealthy banker, is an excellent example of the Second Empire style popular among the upper middle class. Grand Trunk Railway station * is the oldest continuously operating railway station in Canada and still serves the mainline between Toronto and Montreal. The Belleville Armory is listed on the Register of the Government of Canada Heritage Buildings. The town was the first location for Dixie Lee Fried Chicken fast food and became the fourth largest chicken franchise company in Canada.

Presqu'ile Provincial Park. Near the town of Brighton. Lighthouse Center and park centre. Highly favoured camping area located on a peninsula extending out in Lake Ontario.








NORTHHUMBERLAND COUNTY

Enjoy wellness and spa life in Cobourg and Grafton. Ride the antique heritage carousel with 40 basswood horses for a timeless musical journey in Roseneath.



10 DAY TEN

Travel from Belleville to Oshawa.

• Trenton. Gateway to the Trent waterway. National Air Force Museum of Canada hosts over 30 aircraft, including a Halifax NA337 bomber, Harvard Trainer, CF101-Voodoo fighter, Dakota freighter and a Russian MiG-21. A Lancaster bomber is being restored by volunteers at a cost of nearly a million dollars. Honors are paid to Colonel Chris Hatfield's career as the first Canadian astronaut to walk free in space and to command the International Space Station. Learn the amazing story of The Great Escape by Canadian airmen held Prisoners of War at Stalag Luft III during WWII. Note the memorabilia from RCAF-Flyers Olympic Champions in 1948. CFB Trenton manages the fleet of Canada's tactical transport and search and rescue aircraft.


- Coubourg. The Victorian Town Hall* is one of the finer public buildings from the 1850s. It reflects the prevalent economic optimism of the times.
- Port Hope was the first permanent settlement of Empire Loyalists from New York state that arrived in 1793. The port later provided waterfront access for **Eldorado*** at the Cameco refinery marking the development of nuclear energy from uranium ore where it extracted radium used in the early treatment of cancer. In 1942, soon after the atom was split for the first time, the Canadian government acquired Eldorado to refine uranium oxide. The only operation of its kind in North America, it supplied uranium for American nuclear research during WWII. Since 1995, the facility has processed uranium to fuel reactors throughout the world in production of electricity. The discovery of uranium in Elliot Lake is another example of Canada's rich endowment of natural resources.
- Bowmanville. Step back to different times with a visit to Clarington Museum, and Tyrone Mills. Since 1846 it has been a grist mill, bakery and apple cider producer. A group of stalag-like buildings was once a progressive boys school, and later used as an internment camp for Prisoners of War* during WWI. The buildings are abandoned and vandalized since being designated a controversial national historic site.
- Oshawa. Canadian Automotive Museum features Canadian built cars from 1900 to 1945 during a time when many small car companies operated in Ontario. A 46-hp 1929 Chev-6 on display sold originally for \$665. When Henry Ford heard of Chevrolets' success with increased cylinders, he rushed

to build the 8-cylinder engine. Ford introduced the V8 in 1932. It is the Canadian headquarters of GM Canada with auto assembly plants that encompass the city. Robert McLoughlin Gallery pays tribute to the Group of Eleven, the first group of abstract Collective in Ontario.

The Ontario Regiment Museum has a hundred operational military vehicles that feature a "Battle Royale" on Saturdays where two WWII Leopard tanks go-head-to head in the make-shift battlefield.

• York Durham Headwaters counties are referred to as YDH! Canada's Wonderland is the nation's premier amusement park with the longest and fastest dive coaster in the world. Families can easily spend a full day at Wonderland. Next door you will find one of Toronto's largest outlet malls Vaughan Mills. Numerous wineries offer wine tasting in the Holland Marsh area. Take a selfguided tour back through the prohibition era and the temperance movement in YDH.

Veer inland to farming country. Cross Hwy#400 north of Toronto to Kleinburg and Guelph.

• Kleinburg is home to the McMichael Art Collection. The Art Gallery features one of the finest collections of the "Group of Seven" artists and numerous works by Canada's Aboriginal peoples. The historic town is nestled in the Humber Valley and ranks as one of Ontario's "cutest" towns. Turn north on York Regional Rd#17 off Hwy#7 (15-minute drive).



Travel from Guelph to Stratford.

- Guelph. Basilica of our Lady of the Immaculate Conception* is a dominant landmark. Irish-born Joseph Connolly, the principle architect of Catholic churches in the late 19 century Ontario, was inspired by the design of the Cologne Cathedral with its characteristic style of twin towers.
- Guelph City Hall* is a two-story limestone building built in the Renaissance Rival style and is representative of a multi-functional city hall which contained the fire hall, public market, jail and library.

MacCrae House*, is the birthplace of Lieutenant-Colonel John MacCrae, who authored one of Canada's best-known literary works, In Flanders Fields, while serving as a field doctor on the front during the First World War.

- West Montrose near Woolwich is known locally as the "Kissing Bridge" where couples are engaged and marriage vows restated. It is one of the oldest enclosed bridges in Canada. It is located on the Grand River 15 km north of Waterloo.
- St. Jacobs is set in a charming location along the Conestoga River. The Mennonite Museum traces the Old Order Mennonite population from migration to the early settlements. The region has many unique shops featuring local crafts. Aberfoyle Model Railway Museum offers 3,000 sq ft of rail history. Waterloo Central Railway's vintage train rides runs both diesel and steam locomotives.

• Waterloo includes the three cities of Kitchener, Cambridge and Waterloo. Take the region's ION light rail transit for a hop-on/ off tour through Kitchener-Windsor corridor which lays claim to a centre for e-commerce since the development of Blackberry wireless devices in 1990s. RIM enjoyed unprecedented growth until Apple iPhones hit the market in 2007.

Doon Heritage Village sits on an open-air 60-acre living history museum with railway station, weavery, harness shop and saw mill powered by a steam engine. It serves as a case study of how museum interpretation has changed over the past fifty years when it was realized that urban sprawl was destroying rural life.

• **Kitchener** on the Grand River is the highest elevation for many miles around. John Schneider Heritage House* is a living history museum recreating life in the 19th century. German immigrants brought with them their language, religion and cultural traditions. The world's second largest Oktoberfest outside of Munich brings oompah brass bands and German beer to the annual Thanksgiving party. The vote to change the former name of Berlin to Kitchener won by a slim margin.

Be prepared to encounter horse and buggies trotting down the shoulder of roads and highways. There are over a dozen Old Order Mennonite communities in the Waterloo Region and Norfolk County.

• Stratford. Best known for staging Shakespearean plays during the Stratford Festival. Multiple theatres around the city include the Festival Theatre, Avon Theatre and Tom Paterson Theatre. The City Hall* sits on a triangular town square of Victorian-period design which incorporates market stalls, a concert hall, police station, council chamber and fire hall. Stratford is the hometown of Justin Bieber, a modern music icon.

Close to the town centre is the administrative centre and receiving home for Immigrant Home Children* where possibly up to 100,000 children were brought from the UK to serve as domestic servants and farm labourers between 1869 and 1939. This period in history signifies a poignant chapter in Canadian immigration that is little known.

1 DAY ONE - GUELPH TO STRATFORD

Stratford City Hall* is a monumental red brick building with a prominent clock tower built in 1889.

Saint Mary's is known as "Stonetown" for the limestone blocks quarried near the banks of the Thames River. Green interpretive plagues on historic buildings explain the history of the old Opera House and concert hall, grist mill and old mill dam in the heritage conservation district. Saint Mary's Presbyterian Church is a landmark noticeable by its 40 m steeple. Junction Station* is an outstanding example of early railroad architecture set on the Grand Trunk line to Sarnia. Markers show the way to the railway historic bridge, water tower, museum and train station gallery.

The period buildings and town layout in Paris, Ontario, is of a similar architectural style.

2 DAY TWO

Travel from Stratford to Hamilton.

Follow along the Niagara Escarpment towards Hamilton and the Niagara wine region.

• Cambridge/Galt were amalgamated as part of the Regional Municipality of Waterloo. Old Order Mennonites from Pennsylvania and an influx of Germans have maintained a strong ethnic presence. City Hall was first to achieve the gold ranking from the Canadian Green Building Council. The Old Post Office* is now Canada's first all-digital library. The building style is a blend of architecture reflecting Gothic Revival and the Second Empire styles. Hi-tech light shows transform the façade into a dazzling evening attraction.

African Lion Safari is a drive-through game reserve to watch lions, baboons, rhino, giraffes and elephants.

Grand River Conservation areas are lands set aside in 12 parks with paid admission for recreational use.



Route - 150 km Head back east towards Kitchener on Hwy#8, continue south on Hwy#8 through Cambridge to Hamilton.



• Hamilton sits at the base of the Niagara Escarpment on the western edge of Lake Ontario and is known as "Steel Town" for its cluster of steel mills. Visit the Royal Botanical Gardens, Canada's Warplane Heritage Museum, and Stoney Creek Battlefield Monument at the site of a decisive battle during the War of 1812. Visit the stately 40-room Dundurn Castle*.

Take the Lincoln Alexander Parkway to the **Devil's Punch Bowl** along the Ridge Road on Hwy#7. The Devil's Punchbowl was formed at the end of the last ice age by huge melt-water rivers that plunged over the Stoney Creek Escarpment, carving out the seemingly endless Punchbowl and gorge.

Beamer's Memorial Conservation Area. Located in Grimsby, 30 minutes east of Hamilton. During migrations, thousands of raptors are seen surfing the onshore updraft winds towards the escarpment cliffs. The tally of hawks, falcons, eagles and vultures are counted by volunteer hawk watchers.

Visit the Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area in Milton (45 minutes north of Hamilton) and hike to the top of the Niagara Escarpment for breathtaking views of the region. Rock climbing lessons available.



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THE NIAGARA RIVER

The Niagara River connects Lake Ontario and Lake Erie. The Welland Ship Canal by-passes the river to provide navigation for deep sea vessels between Lake Ontario and Lake Erie. Farther upstream the Detroit River provides a shipping channel that joins Lake Erie to Lake Huron as part of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

J DAY THREE

Travel to points of interest around the Niagara Peninsula.

- Port Weller. Port of entry to the Welland Ship Canal and beginning of the Welland Canal Parkway. The canal waterway rises through a series of locks to gain 99.5 m over 46 km as a way past the Niagara Escarpment to Lake Erie. A ship takes about 11 hours to transit the Canal. Some 3,000 ships a year pass through.
- Welland Canal. A scenic drive parallels the canal through four cities from Lake Ontario to Lake Erie, in order of St. Catharines, Thorold, Welland and Port Colborne with several viewing platforms at locks along the 27mile route. Obtain a copy of the Driver's Guide to the Welland Canal at the Welland Canal Museum in St. Catharines.
- Thorold sits about mid-way along the Welland Canal. Historic attractions include Chestnut Hall, Keefer Mansion Inn and Beaverdams Old Methodist Church. Thorold Tunnel runs .84 km under the canal on Hwy#58.

Catharines Museum and Welland Canal Centre, including history exhibits and an observation area above Lock 3. Four locks are within the town borders. Remnants of the original canals are found in various locations as changes were made since its inauguration in 1828. A fourth version opened in 1932 with just eight locks operating the entire length of the canal. Garden City Skyway crosses the canal to allow vessels up to 35.5 metres high to pass beneath.

• Fort Mississauga*. The heritage value of this fort is an important example of military construction completed after the War if 1812. The star-shaped fort is located at the mouth of the Niagara River to protect the Canadian frontier directly opposite Fort Niagara on the American side. A boardwalk follows the shoreline trail along Lake Ontario.

• St. Catharines. Known as the "Garden City", hosts the St.

• Fort George* is a reconstruction of the military fortification of the British army headquarters in Niagara-on-the-Lake. The fort is managed by Parks Canada as a living history site with staff in period costume, demonstrations and highly developed education programs.

LAKE ONTARIO Route - 100 km Head southeast along the shores of Lake Ontario on either Hwy# 8 and Hwy#81, or take Queen Elizabeth Way to St. Catharines. From St. Catharines, follow Hwy#55 northeast to Niagara-on-the-Lake. Alternatively take Hwy#87 from Hwy#81 along the coast of Lake Ontario to Niagara-on-the-Lake.

> • Niagara-on-the Lake has ample reason to be nick-named the "Loveliest Town in Canada". Flower gardens and hanging baskets adorn the main street lined with quaint shops located in neo-classical buildings. Prince of Wales Hotel symbolizes the colonial style in the historic district since it became the first capital of Upper Canada from 1792 to 1796.

3 DAY THREE - HAMILTON TO NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE

- George Bernard Shaw, who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in Literature in 1925, is commemorated by the Shaw Festival when it hosts a series of annual theatre productions. Memorial Hall is Ontario's oldest museum building and houses a vast collection of War of 1812 artifacts. It provides driving routes to the location of major battles and national historic sites in the Niagara area.
- Queenston Heights. Brock's Monument* stands 65m in height and is the largest of its kind in Canada. It commemorates the heroism of Major-General Sir Isaac Brock on the site of the pivotal Battle of Queenston Heights when the Americans established a beachhead for invasion of Canada at the beginning of the War of 1812.



Niagara Peninsula Wine Region is the largest wine producing area in Canada. It stretches for roughly 55 km between Hamilton on the south shore of Lake Ontario to the north shore of Lake Erie. The VQA stands for Vintners Quality Alliance and ensures that wine is made from 100% Ontario-grown grapes.



4 DAY FOUR

Spend an extra day in the Niagara Falls region.

Niagara Falls is one of North America's most famous geographic spectacles and is known as a romantic haven for honeymooners.

• Niagara Falls. Stroll between the best viewpoints of the famous Horseshoe Falls from alongside the river ledge in front of Queen Victoria Place. Highlights include Niagara City Cruise river tour below the falls, and the 160 m high Skylon Tower with observation deck overlooking the curving crest of the 180 m Horseshoe Falls and American Falls from the Canadian side of the Niagara River. The Aerial Cable Car spans 540 m over the Whirl Pool Rapids where the Niagara River rushes through the gorge at 2,800 cubic meters/sec. The Sir Adam Beck Generating Complex* landmark offers interactive displays to illustrate hydro power development at the first major power plant on the Canadian side of the Niagara River. Find deals with an Attractions Pass.



Follow the Niagara Parkway from Niagara Falls to Fort Erie that weaves in and out along the Welland Canal. Turn west to visit numerous splendid beaches along the north shore of Lake Erie.

• Fort Erie. Old Fort Erie*, facing the Niagara River was once a garrison during the War of 1812. Now fully restored by the Niagara Parks Commission, it offers military re-enactments. Fort Erie Railway Museum features a steam locomotive and a station transformed into an exhibition space. Mather Arch overlooks the five-span Peace Bridge that connects to Buffalo, NY, at the mouth of the Niagara River. The triple arch stone monument with manicured gardens is a symbol of lasting friendship between Canada and the U.S.

Numerous hiking trails include the 56 km Niagara River Recreational Trail. Walk the miles of sandy beaches along the Lake Erie shores. Port Albino lighthouse* is a distinctive Greek Revival-style tower 15 km west of Fort Erie Tower.

Port Colborne serves as one of Canada's largest inland ports on Lake Erie's north coast at the southern terminus of the Welland Canal.



Rock Point and Selkirk Provincial Parks are located along shores of Lake Erie, and offer a range of outdoor experiences from hiking and cycling to swimming and canoeing.

- Nanticoke*. Once the location of several heavy industries, including a steel mill and oil refinery, the coal-fired generating station has been converted to a 44 MW solar farm. The city has been designated a national historic site with unidentified archaeological remains on the banks of Lake Erie.
- The Grand River, meanders for 275 km from its source near Fergus and Kitchener-Waterloo to enter Lake Eire at Port Maitland. It serves as a well known canoe route between Montrose and Paris that transits the Grand River Conservancy.

NORFOLK COUNTY

Ontario's Garden for farm fresh produce. Orchards produce apples and peaches. Field crops include grains, corn silage, barley, soybeans, sweet corn, peas, wax beans, pumpkins and squash. Dairy farms, cattle herds, pig farms, and thousands of chicken farms make Southern Ontario a vast agricultural domain. Self-guided tour weaves past scattered vineyards along the coast and inland on rural roads between Port Dover and St. Thomas. Norfolk County includes a series of lakeside towns strung out along the shore, including Port Dover, Turkey Point, Port Rowan and Long Point.

Travel from Nanticoke to St. Thomas.

Follow the sandy coastal route along the north shore of Lake Erie to explore ports that offer many different elements and stories. Norfolk County Barn Quilt Trail follows along the coastal roads.

• Port Dover. Visit the scenic wooden pier, and Harbour Museum partially housed in an original fisherman's net shanty. Exhibits showcase the days of commercial fishing, ship building and rum running. Fishermen soon switched to the profitability of hauling bootleg liquor to the States at record speed across the 30 km of open water.

Barns and other structures are located on private property painted with folk art designs to look like a quilt. While spread throughout southwestern Ontario, the RV touring route runs through a cluster of patterns with various themes in rural Norfolk County, from Port Dover to Port Rowan.

Cliff Site* cairn stands where two priests in 1670 laid claim to the north shore of Lake Erie in the name of France. It was a wintering site for the first Europeans known to have ascended the Great Lakes to Sault Ste. Marie.

Route - 160 km Head west from Nanticoke on Hwy#3, and Hwy#6 to Port Dover. From Port Dover head west on Hwy#6, and join Hwy#24. Side routes include Hwy#57 to Port Ryerse, Hwy#10 to Turkey Point, and Hwy#59 to Port Rowan. From Port Rowan, head north on Hwy#59 and Hwy#3 to Tillsonburg. Continue west on Hwy#3 to St. Thomas.



- Port Ryerse was founded by United Empire Loyalists in 1794 as a port for shipping lumber and grain.
- Turkey Point. Site of a military post during the War of 1812.
- Port Rowan. Big Creek winds through Carolinian forest towards Port Rowan on Lake Erie. It is part of the Long Point World Biosphere Reserve and Big Creek National Wildlife Area. Hahn Woods is an extensive woody swamp area that offers extensive waterfowl nesting and staging for over thirty bird species. Keep an eye out for an unusual activity with "punters on the marsh" that looks something like pushing paddle boards through shallow water. Visit Canada's first forestry station interpretive centre with a giant old growth white pine log used to describe historic events by matching the annual growth rings over two hundred years.
- Port Burwell. HMCS Objibwa was Canada's first Cold War submarine. This small Ontario town has undertaken Project Ojibiwa with its determination to become the home of the stealth Oberon Class Sub at Canada' Naval History Museum, located a thousand miles from the Atlantic Ocean.



Shaw's famous ice cream dairy bar in Tillsonburg offers dozens of flavours of high-quality ice cream.

- Tillsonburg. Travel north in Norfolk County. Annandale* is one of the few remaining Victorian-style mansions of the Aesthetic movement from the 1880s.
- St. Thomas is home to the North America Railway Hall of Fame. The Canada Southern Railway Station* served as one of the busiest in Canada when completed in 1873. The classical design made it unique within Canadian architectural history and stands as a symbol of intensive railway development in Ontario. The Michigan Central Railroad Bridge over Kettle Creek now serves as Canada's first elevated rail-trail made up of 14 spans running 260 m / 855 feet. Box car murals are featured at Elgin County Railway Museum.
- **Port Stanley** is famed for a short-line tourist train re-established on the road bed of the London & Port Stanley Railway. PSTR operates five diesel-electric locomotives from the 1940s along with nine colorful passenger cars during a one-hour train ride. It was one of the first railroads built in Ontario, starting in 1856.



Continue through Essex County towards the western end of Lake Erie at Amherstburg and the outlet of the Detroit River.

DAY SEVEN

Travel from St. Thomas to Amherstburg.

• Leamington, once famous for growing tobacco, is the "Tomato Capital of Canada" humorously portrayed by Canadian recording artist Stomp'n Tom Connors who wrote "Ketchup Loves Potatoes". The surrounding area is known for large greenhouse operations. Marina features a promenade that extends to a historic dock and a port for ferry service to Pelee Island. Leamington Arts Centre showcases the art and history of Essex County.



Point Pelee National Park*, known as the "100 Mile Peninsula", is the most southerly point in Canada at Latitude 41.68N. A shuttle runs from the Visitor Centre for 2 km out to the wind-swept tip. A boardwalk stretches across the marsh. Take a self-guided interpretative walk to the tip tower for viewing shorebird habitat and flyway during seasonal migration.

- Pelee Island is served by a 90-minute ferry ride from Leamington on the Pelee Islander. The island features sand and pebble beaches. It sits on both the Atlantic Flyway and the Mississippi Flyway. A good place to bike. The remains of a lighthouse, built in 1834, stands at the tip of the spit. The tip is surrounded by dangerous currents and undertows.
- Wheatley. Fresh fish processing at the port. Lake Erie, with its numerous harbors has the most productive commercial fishery of all the Great Lakes. Look for fresh walleye in season.



Visit **Crazy 8 Barn & Garden** in Palmyra for some tasty eats and a garden workshop.

AMHERSTBURG

Fort George, Fort Mississauga and Fort Malden were fortifications and battlefronts during the War of 1812.

• Amherstburg. Visit the Freedom Museum and Nazrey African Methodist Episcopal Church*. Terminus of the Underground Railroad provided a way out from slavery in the 1770s when the US Civil War began. Also known as the "North American Black History Museum", dedicated to preserving African-Canadian history of abolition of slavery. The Underground Railroad was a code name used to disguise the movement of slaves where they could be helped to escape along a series of secret routes. Black history is also told at the 20-acre John Freeman Walls* and Underground Railroad Museum located about forty km east of Windsor.

Park House* is considered one of the oldest houses in the region, built in 1796, and tells the story of the traders who populated the Windsor region.

Fort Malden facing the Detroit River served as the frontier fortification against American incursions in the War of 1812. It was then re-established when troops were required to push back against rebels and their American sympathizers in the 1838 rebellion. It features interpretative displays, costumed guides and musket firings.





DETROIT RIVER

The Detroit River flows southerly for 51 km (26 miles) along the Canada/USA international border from Lake St. Clair to Lake Erie. Explore five kms of waterfront green space established along the Detroit River in Windsor. The area from Amherstburg at the mouth to Windsor at the source offers a collection of national historic sites including Fort George, Fort Malden and Fort Mississauga that played important roles in settlement and the War of 1812.

9 DAY NINE

Travel from Amherstburg to Windsor.

- Old Sandwich Town, located on the outskirts of Windsor tells the tales of settlement in the descriptive murals and plaques in a small park located at the Harbour Masters building. War veterans' are memorialized with true life stories, starting from the individual's hometown, enlistment, engagement and details of their death during battles in WWII.
 - Sandwich First Baptist Church* dating from 1851 is representative of churches from this period and built to accommodate the communities created by Underground Railroad refugees.
- A display at the Windsor Port Authority yard in Sandwich pays tribute the Battle of Lake Erie resulting in the British abandonment of Detroit. Take the self-guided Heritage Walking Tour to visit some thirty historic sites and buildings. Mackenzie Hall is the oldest building and served as the Essex County Court House for more than 160 years. The port still serves as a conduit for smuggling contraband across the narrow stretch of river.
- Windsor is deemed the "Automotive Capital of Canada" and sits directly across the river from Detroit. Visit many historic attractions and watch the thriving river activity along the Detroit Heritage Parkway

Civic Terrace was transformed from an abandoned rail yard to the permanent location of CNR 5588 steam locomotive* totally rebuilt by volunteers. Visit Windsor's Little Italy or "Via Italia" cuisine.

Detroit Windsor Tunnel is the only vehicular tunnel in the world that crosses international boundaries. Travel more than a kilometer and 25 meters below the surface of the Detroit River.

The Gordie Howe International Bridge construction project will connect an extension of Hwy#401 to Windsor and to the I-5 in Michigan which will eventually replace the Ambassador Bridge. The new six-lane, twin A-shaped towers will support the 2.5 km long bridge with the longest main span of any bridge in North America. The bridge is named after an iconic Canadian hockey player who played in the Motor City for the Detroit Red Wings.

Whiskey History. During the prohibition era, Canadian whiskey and rum provided most of the liquor that flowed to speakeasies across the Detroit River. Take a tasting tour of Hiram Walker and J.P. Wiser's Distillery and learn the history of the whiskey trade in Canada' largest distillery. The Rum Runners tour tells the story with costumed actors during the roaring 20's.



The Ports & Forts Route connects to the <u>Bluewater Route</u> at Sarnia, and north toward the eastern shores of Lake Huron. Continue up the Bruce Peninsula to Tobermory and Manitoulin Island. Connect to <u>The Fur Trade Route</u> cutting across Northern Ontario.





CHATHAM-KENT COUNTY

This is a short drive around the east side of Lake St. Clair and inland on Hwy#2 and Hwy#36 to Catham-Kent. Pickup Hwy#21 towards Dresden and Petrolia, and then northwest to Sarnia.



1 DAY ONE

Travel from Windsor to Sarnia.



Windsor area is the starting point for the Bluewater route. Refer to Ports & Forts Route (p.36) for more information on this city.


- Lake St. Clair is recognized as a Great Lake and officially part of the St. Lawrence Waterway. It extends 65 km from Lake Erie to Lake Huron. It is a very popular spot for leisure boaters. There are a number of lovely beaches and parks along the shorelines, including Fishers Bay or Bouvier (Munchies Bay) on the Canadian side.
- Catham-Kent lies inland at the head of navigation on the Thames River where Chief Tecumseh was killed at the Battle of the Thames. The local museum offers a new exhibit On our Doorstep: The War of 1812. The town also served as the northern terminus of the code-named 'Underground Railroad' a network of safe-houses that helped escaped slaves from the USA.

A Taste of Science is a Canada Agriculture & Food Museum that highlights the role science plays in delaying food decay and keeping it safe for human consumption. Learn food preservation techniques through interactive displays. It is part of a travelling road show that moves around Ontario.

Dresden. The Dawn Settlement recognizes the efforts of Josiah Henson, a preacher and abolitionist who established himself as a "conductor" on the Underground Railroad. Known as "Uncle Tom", he raised the awareness of Canada as a haven for refugees from slavery. The Josiah Henson Museum of African-Canadian History* sits on a 2 ha site with buildings housing an interpretive centre, Freedom Gallery and North Star Theatre. A sawmill and farm was set up to educate Black Pioneers. A national historic plague marks the Henson Family Cemetery*.



- Oil Springs was the site of the first commercial oil wells in the world and the first gas gusher in Canada.
- Petrolia, known as "Canada's Victorian Oil Town", was once one of the wealthiest towns in North America after oil was discovered in 1858 which led to an oil boom. Visit the Petrolia Discovery Museum for a history of the oil patch. The clock tower* on the city hall symbolizes the prosperity of days gone by.
- The Oil Museum of Canada* provides directions for a selfdrive tour around the wells to observe the unique jerker line system that was invented to pump oil to the surface from multiple wells from a single engine. Tune into the Oil Heritage District FM radio driving tour.

Victoria Playhouse* conducts seasonal performances on centre stage in the historic Victorian Hall.

Sarnia sits on the eastern bank at the source of the St. Clair River draining Lake Huron. A historical plaque is mounted under the Blue Water Bridge in commemoration of the voyage of French explorer Sieur de La Salle who was the first to propel his 45-ton barque against the powerful current of the St. Clair River. The port remains an important centre for lake freighters who service the three oil refineries. Crude oil arrives by a large pipeline from Alberta. It is no coincidence that the oil refineries in Sarnia are located only 27 km from the first discovery of oil in North America. Many "hardliners" from the oil patch set off around the world to help train workers expand oil production by sharing this new technology.

Climate change however forces new developments even here. A photovoltaic power station in "Chemical Valley" is a large solar generating facility producing 97 MV from an area that covers 450 hectares with 1.3 mm thin-film solar panels. The process converts electricity from sunlight but generates heat domes with negative effects on climate warming.

Cruise along the St. Clair River aboard the Duc d'Orleans for a close-up look at the bustling harbor, with lake freighters, luxurious yachts, and speedy runabouts. Walking trails circle the parks and marinas that stretch from downtown Sarnia to Point Edward. Another trail leads for 16 km from La Salle along the St. Clair River to Sarnia.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY

Head inland to London and then back to the beaches stretching from Kettle Point in a straight line along Hwy#7 to Ipperwash Beach, Port Franks and Pinery Provincial Park. A series of lighthouses strung out along the coast are grim reminders of the perils of navigation on the Great Lakes.



DAY TWO

Travel from Sarnia to Grand Bend.

• London side trip. Situated on the Thames River inland about 60 km on Hwy#22, straight east of Sarnia. Banting House* is named in honor of Sir Frederick Banting co-discoverer of insulin. Numerous museums include Museum London, Spirit of Flight Aviation Museum, Canadian Medicine Hall of Fame and Royal Canadian Regiment Museum. Tour the historic Grand Theatre with two stages, and Labatt's Brewery named after one of Canada's pioneering brewing dynasties. The Factory is Canada's largest indoor adventure park.

The Fanshawe Conservation Area offers 24 km of walking trails and canoe rentals on the Upper Thames River. The Pioneer Village contains 30 heritage buildings.



London is a connecting point to the Ports & Forts Route and Waterway Route.

Port Franks is located on Lake Huron. Protected beach is closed to the public. Large suburban development with more tourists in summer. Ipperwash Beach has a long sandy beach and sand dunes with public access.



Pinery Provincial Park contains one of the largest remaining forested areas in Southern Ontario. Coastal dune fields feature several types of dunes that occur naturally to sustain windswept beaches. They continuously form as sand erodes from the shoreline bluffs to the north, and is deposited on the beaches between Grand Bend and Kettle Point to the south. A constant onshore breeze then deposits the sand from the storm beaches to locations further inland.

Discover a long uninterrupted sandy beach near Grand Bend. The beaches in the park do not have change facilities or buoyed areas. There are no lifeguards on the beaches.

• Grand Bend is one of the busiest towns on the coast where many recreational properties have made it a generational destination. It is still a scenic location at the beach front. Visit Lambton County Heritage Museum in Grand Bend. Huron beaches change constantly with the force of waves, wind and currents. A dune restoration project at Grand Bend is being undertaken with planting marram grasses and fence installation to protect the fragile dunes. The Lake Huron Centre for Coastal Conservation encourages land owners to become stewards of the dunes.

Fanshawe Conservation Area. London. Minimum two-night stay on weekends and three nights on long weekends. Services: Electrical. Flush toilets/showers. Pull-thru sites.

SAUGEEN COUNTY

Lake Huron beaches stretch for miles all along Ontario's West Coast, with multiple points of access from the Bluewater Hwy. Hwy#21 parallels the coast from Grand Bend to Southampton. Hwy#23 is a coast road from Point Clark.



Travel from Grand Bend to Southampton.

- Huron County stretches 110 km from Clinton to Goderich on Ontario's West Coast. Villages are surrounded by a patchwork of mixed farming, grain and dairy farms. Bluewater Heritage Walking Tours are laid out on street maps with a description of manor houses in Bayfield and Zurich that feature historic buildings and architectural styles.
- Saint Joseph historical park describes the French-Canadian communities who left Quebec to establish settlements along the "Bluewater Highway". Narcisse Cantin had a vision for a canal linking Lakes Huron and Erie and a broader concept of a deepwater canal through the Great Lakes that would eventually become the St. Lawrence Seaway.
- Bayfield. A popular tourist destination. Designated a heritage conservation district with many well-preserved buildings. Beach life culture.
- "The Kicker" is the main wakeboard feature at Windmill Lake Eco Park near Bayfield. It is the first bi-level wake park in Canada.
- Clinton. Slightly inland past Bayfield on Hwy#8 sits an 80-foot long CNR School on Wheels. Northern Ontario's unique railcar served as a rolling school for forty years, travelling 240 km between Capreol and Foleyet to bring education to remote northern families.

- known as "The Square" that radiates in all directions from Huron County Court House*. Huron County Gaol* is a walled prison in the panoptical design constructed in line with British prisons dating from the 1850s. It now hosts a museum. Surrounding farmland produces mostly wheat crops that feed large flour mills.
- Point Clark Lighthouse* stands as a safety beacon to mariners. The 87' high cylindrical stone tower warns of an offshore shoal. The light keeper's dwelling serves as a museum. Road access.
- Kincardine is a small tourist destination with cute local shops, a beach, and a lighthouse where the 'Phantom Piper' pipes down the sun every day in summer. As in keeping with its Scottish ancestry, the town declared itself "Ontario's Scottish Destination on Lake Huron". Interpretive signs along the boardwalk tell of local shipwrecks. It is also becoming known as a surfing centre. Huron Wind Farm operates over 400 windmills in Bruce County. The operation is Ontario's first commercial wind farm producing enough electricity to power 3,000 homes. Bruce Power* was the first CANDU reactor, contributing to the success of larger nuclear reactors in Canada and abroad. The plant also recovers Cobalt-60 for use in cancer treatments. 

Ascent Aerial Park is a family adventure park featuring obstacle courses, axe throwing and Canada's first ZIP Coaster. Earthbound Gardens in Red Bay features self-guided free garden tours, a gift shop and a nursery.

- Bruce Trail. The entire 850 km trail starts from Niagara to Tobermory, and to the top of the Bruce Peninsula. The end-toend trail could be hiked in thirty days, or piece-by-piece. Bicycles and motorized vehicles are not permitted. Camping sites are restricted to designated areas only, as outlined in the Bruce Trail Conservancy directive. This portion of the trail runs along the eastern shoreline between Lion's Head and Tobermory.
- Greig's Caves offer self-guided tours along rugged trails through 10 limestone caves on the Bruce Peninsula. Please be advised that when exploring Greig's Caves, you travel the property at your own risk.
- Wiarton. A furry iconic tourist attraction known as "Wiarton Willie" emerges from his den on Groundhog Day to predict whether it will be a long winter or an early spring. A statue of Willy of Wiarton stands near the shoreline in Bluewater Park. The waterfront trail on shores of Colpoy's Bay in Wiarton is a hard-surfaced portion of the Bruce Trail. This beautiful shoreline path is close to downtown with restaurants and shops.

to the Grotto sea caves with its crystal blue water. Capacity limits are in
place for the Grotto. Make sure to check with Parks Canada for day use
reservations.

- Bruce Peninsula National Park* protects 156 square miles
 of wilderness along the northern range of the Niagara
 Escarpment and named in honour of James Bruce, the 8th
 Earl of Elgin, who served as the Governor General of Canada,
 when Canada was just a province. The park is known for many
 species of wild orchids that flourish in the moderate climate.
 Please see page 60 regarding parking and reservations.
- **Tobermory.** The village hosts galleries, tourist shops and a historic lighthouse.

The Five Fathom National Marine Park* is known as the "freshwater SCUBA diving capital of the world" with 22 shipwrecks lying between 10 and 150 feet below the surface. Dive tags are required and available in Little Tub Harbour. Ship wrecks are also accessible with a glass bottom tour boat from Blue Heron Tours. Dive shops also offer snorkeling to explore the crystal blue water along the shoreline.

The St. Edmunds & Peninsula Museum reflects the life experience of the early settler families on the northern Bruce Peninsula. Tour a 19th century one-room school house museum and visit an 1875 cabin where Jacob and Agnes Belrose raised a family of eight children.

The Tobermory port is the south terminal for the MS Chi-Cheemaun car carrier to South Baymouth. Known as the "Big Canoe", the passenger ferry has capacity for 600 passengers and up to 150 vehicles. The two-hour crossing allows sufficient time to enjoy a full-service cafeteria, floating art gallery, and the "Boatique" shopping for casual gear. Live performances are sometimes offered. The ship makes two or three round trips per day. Reservations are strongly recommended. In Tobermory. Try a delicious fried dough pastry known as a *Beavertail* – a tradition for many before boarding the ferry.

There are a few route options available on travel on Manitoulin Island. Hwy#6 will bring visitors through Manitouwaning and Sheguiandah to Hwy#540 at Little Current. Hwy#542 will follow the southern portion of the island through Mindemoya to Gore Bay. Hwy#551 will cut across from Mindemoya and eventually connect to Hwy#540 at M'Chigeeng. Hwy#540 follows the north side of the island to Meldrum Bay.

• Sheguiandah. Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah highlights a collection of settler tools and President Roosevelt's 1943 wartime visit to the area.

A roadside marker at 10 Mile Point explains the Jesuit history where a mission was established in 1648, and abandoned two years later after the defeat of the Hurons by the Iroquois.

The bedrock of the Canadian Shield has yielded a discovery at the Sheguiandah Archeological Site*. Aboriginal peoples quarried quartzite on a series of ancient beach terraces, leaving behind ancient artifacts. A boardwalk leads up a gentle hillside slope.

• Little Current is located on Mississagi Straits where it enters the North Channel. North Channel Cruise Line offers day trips around the islands from the downtown main dock. Little Current is a port of call and a spot to moor for several cruise lines operating on the Great Lakes.

The Manitoulin Hotel & Conference Centre in Little Current features natural elements of wood, stone and décor reflecting the First Nations traditions. Enjoy an authentic Indigenous dining experience with views of the LaCloche Mountain range and the North Channel on Lake Huron.



• Wikwemikong organizes one of the largest, longest running Pow Wow's in Northeastern America the first week of August every year.

Cross the swing bridge over the narrow channel and head north on Hwy#6 to the junction with the Fur Trade Route on Hwy#17 at McKerrow.

- Manitoulin Island. Take some time to finish exploring near Little Current and nearby points of interest on Manitoulin Island.
- Little Current Swing Bridge. Vehicles on the one-lane 369-foot swing bridge* are controlled by the only traffic light on the island.
- Willisville Mountain in the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy forms part of the La Cloche Mountain chain along the northern shore of Lake Huron towards Killarney Provincial Park. The quartz formation is believed to have once been higher than the Rocky Mountains. Parts of the trail are challenging to reach the 543 m (1,781 ft) summit.

DISCOVER THE WORLD'S LARGEST FRESHWATER LAKE

Lake Superior is powerful. The largest lake in the world evokes an ocean temperament that makes weather and water conditions change quickly and give rise to nightmarish storms. The beauty of the extensive North Shore is viewed best from many beaches and viewpoints off the scenic drive on Hwy#17. Its size can be measured by a drop of water that takes 200 years to circulate before exiting the lake's only natural outlet, the St. Mary's River at Sault Ste. Marie.

The Group of Seven Touring Route so inspired the founding members of Canada's internationally renowned Group of Seven that they made nine trips every fall between 1921 and 1928. The trail connects some of their painting sites that are found readily along the shores of Lake Superior. Find out more at momentsofalgoma.ca.

The archipelago of Rossport Islands provides one of the most varied wilderness paddling experiences on all of Lake Superior. The Lake Superior Water Trail offers canoeing and kayaking at many entry points.

The Lake Superior National Marine Conservation Area is the largest freshwater protected area in the world extending over 10,000 sq km of lakebed and associated shoreline.

Remote sections on Hwy#17 / 11

Watch for sudden weather changes with heavy snow and wind on isolated stretches of highways with few or no services during April and early May in Spring, and late September–October in Fall along the north shore of Lake Superior. Gale-force winds can quickly develop over the north shore of Lake Superior. Keep an eye on your fuel and propane before heading north around the crest of Lake Superior where gas stations may close in the evening, and on Sundays.

DAY ONE

Travel from Toronto to Parry Sound.

- Go north from Toronto RV rental stations. There are numerous highways heading north from Metro Toronto. Take **Hwy#12** through farmland and horse ranches around Sandford and Brock Township with stone houses built in the 1890s.
- Orillia. A large Catholic church sits on a hill that dominates the approach to Orillia from the east side of Lake Simcoe and gives an insight to the early settlers whose headstones commemorate the area's Irish ancestors (see p. 15 for more information).
- Parry Sound is cradled on Georgian Bay with a large harbour and a rail bridge trestle spanning right across town, and a Tower Hill with 360 degree view of Georgian Bay surrounded by mixed forests. The ice hockey superstar Bobby Orr Hall of Fame is located on the waterfront.
- Island Queen Cruises operates two and three hour cruises from the pier in Parry Sound for a close-up look at Georgian Bay's wild and rugged outer islands.

GEORGIAN BAY

There is a noticeable change in landscape along Georgian Bay towards the Canadian Shield. The granite rock formations created by catastrophic events at the end of the ice age illustrate the direction and magnitude of the slowmoving glaciers more than a kilometre thick, almost 2 million years ago.

2 DAY TWO

Travel from Parry Sound to Sudbury.

• Britt. A historic railroad hub connected to shipping coal and timber on the Great Lakes. The old pier is a reminder of a company town gone bust.



French River Provincial Park. A Travel Information Centre and museum at the heritage site on the French River pays tribute to the Lake Nipissing Canoe Route. Voyageurs followed the river west to secure furs from the Objibwe on a voyage of trade and exploration leading north and west of Lake Superior as early as 1659. The French River, although relatively small, was most significant in providing access to westward travel. The Travel Information Center is open Thursday to Monday in spring and fall, and daily in the summer.

Services: Backcountry camping only – No RV camping available at this site. Flush toilets. Park store (seasonal). Travel Information Centre. Hiking trails.



Killarney Provincial Park. Hwy#637 (125 km) return to Hwy#69. Dominated by La Cloche Mountains with pink granite and white quartzite hills overlooking the coastline of Georgian Bay. Killarney Provincial Park is recognized as a nationally certified Dark Sky Preserve by the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada.

Services: George Lake Campground is open for camping all year. Electrical. Showers/flush toilets. Laundry. Hiking trails. Park Store (seasonal) and Canoe Rentals nearby.

• Greater Sudbury. Approaching Sudbury, you will soon see the 380-meter super stack on the horizon. The stack is now disabled as the community becomes more environmentally friendly.

DAY THREE

Travel from Sudbury to Spragge.

- Sudbury. The Dynamic Earth museum in Sudbury needs a full day to visit. Starting at the 12-sided Big Nickel on the hill, mining exhibits feature every kind of geology. A onehour underground tour with exhibits show the history of mining technology in the Canadian north.
- Optional side route to Manitoulin Island. Turn left at McKerrow on Hwy#6 to Whitefish Falls, across Great La Cloche Island to Little Current where roads lead to villages and waterfront resorts. At least a full day is recommended to take in all the magical sights and experiences of Manitoulin Island (see p. 72-78 for details).



The Spanish Marina and Four Seasons Waterfront **Complex** is a bird watchers paradise. A lookout over Lake Huron and the "Provincially Significant Wetlands" allows visitors to observe waterfowl feeding on aquatic vegetation. Information plaques tell of the life in lumber camps and company towns in the 1800s.

Elliot Lake (short side-trip) on Hwy#108 north from Serpent River, was known as the "Uranium Capital of Canada". Once the US military stopped stockpiling yellow cake during the Cold War, the population dwindled from twenty thousand to six thousand as the boom turned to bust, and rebounded as a retirement community. The town features a Nuclear & Mining Museum, Canadian Mining Hall of Fame, and a Miners' Memorial Park. The Fire Tower Lookout and Ranger's Heritage Centre provides a commanding few over the landscape and lakes.





4 DAY FOUR

Travel from Spragge to Sault Ste. Marie.

This route takes us along the north shore of Lake Huron.

- Algoma Mills. Discovery of uranium-rich rock in the area led to an economic boom during the 1950s. The Pronto Mine processed 2.1 million tons of uranium from veins of ore discovered in conglomerate. The mill was then converted to process copper ore until it was closed in 1970.
- Blind River hosts the Northern Ontario Logging Memorial of forest workers, and the Timber Village Museum showing life in the early lumber camps.
- Iron Bridge. The Tulloch and Carlyle houses are replicas of the first homesteads, located east of Iron Bridge. A Travel Information Centre is located at this site.
- Bruce Mines saw the discovery of copper in 1846, resulting in the first copper mine in North America. **Tom Thompson** of the Group of Seven painted "View over a Lake Shore with Houses" in 1912.



Fort St. Joseph National Historic Site. Located on St. Joseph Island 56 kms east of Sault Ste. Marie. The British chose the location for its proximity to the navigation routes controlling the fur trade and access to the Great Lakes. The fort served as a base for the first British military maneuvers against the Americans in the War of 1812.

• Echo Bay. See the Loon Dollar monument, which was erected to honor wildlife artist Robert R. Carmichael, a resident of the village and artist responsible for the 1987 coin's loon design.

Objiway Park. Located south of Sault Ste. Marie just outside Echo Bay on Hwy#17B after the Echo Bay Bridge. Beach front on sandy shores of Laying Water Beach. Operated by Garden River First Nation.

Services: Electrical. Shower/flush toilets. Sani-dump. Pavilion rental.





OPTIONAL EXTRA DAY

Stay an extra day in Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie. A major centre along the St. Mary's River and the shores of both Lake Huron and Lake Superior. City highlights include the Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre and the Ermatinger Clergue National Historic Site* — reminders of northern settlement. Take a walk around town to visit numerous Heritage Properties, watch for 1923 Pilgrimage of History Plaques featuring buildings with historical and architectural significance.

• Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre. Check out the de Havilland DHC-2 Beaver, the classic Canadian single-engine bush plane with pontoon floats designed to land and take off at outposts on small lakes, or to drop firefighting crews off at forest fires. On display is CF-OBS, the second oldest Beaver that was built in 1948. It was operated by the Ontario Provincial Air Service throughout the northwest. See the history of forest fire fighting brought to life through a 20-minute movie.

• Agawa Canyon Tour Train. The train departs from downtown Sault Ste. Marie on a one-day excursion into the heart of the Canadian wilderness. In 1912, the Group of Seven (G7) rented a box car along the rail line to house their studio in the bush. The 180-km rail journey follows the shores of lakes and rivers, and ends at the bottom of the Agawa Canyon. A dining car serves hot and cold meals. This trip is magnificent in September and October for fall colour viewing, and always sells out early. The train operates daily from early June to October.

Site*. Sault Ste. Marie Canal was the first Bateau lock, just 38 feet long and 8 foot wide when built by the North West Company in 1768 as a means for voyageurs to by-pass the rapids on the St. Mary's River. Today's locks are one of the world's longest where pleasure craft can be seen in transit from South St. Mary's Island. Ocean freighters navigate the St. Lawrence Seaway from the Atlantic Ocean to Lake Superior where the locks

5 DAY FIVE

Travel from Sault Ste. Marie to Wawa. Follow the rugged shores of Lake Superior, renowned as one of the greatest RV drives in the world.

Chippewa Falls drops 13 meters in two stages. There is a rest stop just to the side of the highway bridge. A plaque marks the half-way point on the Trans Canada Highway between St. John, Newfoundland, and Victoria, BC. Look for another G7 easel by Arthur Lismer entitled "The Little Falls".

Batchawana Bay Provincial Park. Stop by the Voyageurs' Cookhouse filled with artifacts and large paintings of the Fur Trade Route. Ask for a copy of the visitor attractions that are listed on the way to Thunder Bay.



Pancake Bay Provincial Park. 76 km northwest of Sault Ste. Marie. Voyageurs preferred this wide sandy 3-km long beach for stopovers on the canoe route around the top of Lake Superior. A plaque on the lookout trail tells of the sinking of the Edmund Fitzgerald that broke up in a violent winter storm and made famous by Canadian folk singer Gordon Lightfoot.

Agawa Crafts and The Canadian Carver offer extensive native crafts, cottage-themed home décor, wood carvings, animal sculptures, furs and moccasins. Ample parking is available at the highway rest stop.



Lake Superior Provincial Park is one of the larger parks on the eastern shore of Lake Superior. Displays illustrate the effect of "rebounding" on the Shield which is a term to describe how bed rock rises after removal of the massive weight of glaciers. Another G7 easel marks the area where J.E.H. MacDonald came to Algoma Country "to find gems of the Canadian landscape". A Travel Information Centre highlighting the park's cultural history, natural features and recreational opportunities is located at Agawa Bay.

Lake Superior Provincial Park is recognized as a nationally certified Dark Sky Preserve by the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada.

Agawa Rock. 8 kms north of Agawa Bay within Lake Superior Provincial Park. See pictographs painted on sheer cliffs rising from Lake Superior. Red ochre figures are painted on a giant canvas of stone to record the stories of generations of Objibwe. Proper footwear is recommended for access along a cobblestone path on the shoreline. Paintings can only be viewed when the lake is calm. Warning signs advise visitors to use extreme caution on the rugged path down to the water's edge. Open mid-May to mid-September. Park permit required.

- Michipicoten. Magpie River Valley features a 75-foot waterfall at the outflow of a reservoir.
- Wawa. A legendary town settled by pioneers located three hours north of Sault Ste. Marie. Follow the "Signs of History" around the town that explain the early beginnings. Look for a statue of early settlers. Take a picture with the famous Land of the Big Goose monument located next to the Travel Information Centre.

Travel from Wawa to Nipigon.

• White River. Started as a railroad divisional point where large blocks of ice were cut from lakes in winter to refrigerate box cars filled with perishables being shipped across the long northern route. See the Historical Society Museum and historic markers. White River is famous for its Winnie-the-Pooh statue built to commemorate the black bear cub that became the mascot for Canadian troops serving overseas during WW II.



Pukaskwa National Park*. Heron Bay. Main entrance to camping and Travel Information Centre is 25 km east of Marathon on Hwy#627 at Hattie Cove. The park features a boardwalk over the sand dunes to the sandy beach on Horseshoe Bay. Interpretive walking trails share important teachings of Anishinaabe culture. Canoe rentals are recommended when the bay is calm. Services: Electrical sites 15 km in from Hwy#17. Showers/flush toilets. Travel Information Centre with displays. Hiking trails. Canoe rentals.

 Marathon was a staging area during construction of the CPR rail line through solid bedrock, mid-way between Sault Ste. Marie and Thunder Bay. Visit Pebble Beach with polished stones along the shore of Lake Superior.



Neys Provincial Park. Neys Camp 100 was one of the first prisoner of war camps that housed German soldiers and enemy civilians during WW II. Prisoners were transported by ship from England, arriving in January, 1941, and held until fall 1943 when the camp was relocated. Prisoners were permitted to leave the confines of barbed wire to work in lumber camps and cut cord wood.

- Terrace Bay. Follow the Casque Isles hiking trail for two kms to
 Terrace Bay beach. Pre-arrange a boat tour to Slate Islands which
 shelters a large herd of Boreal Woodland Caribou. Enjoy views
 from a scenic lookout at the Patterson Lighthouse located behind
 the Travel Information Centre.
- Aguasabon Falls and Gorge is just a half-mile off Hwy#17. Follow the boardwalk to the 100-foot waterfall and gorge. The best time to see this waterfall is in the spring.
- Schreiber. A new Discovery Centre & Railway Museum features the history of the Canadian Pacific Railway. A diesel yard-engine is housed under cover, along with a passenger coach transformed into a virtual theatre, and another box car houses artifacts, uniforms and travel posters. The line faced nearly insurmountable challenges during construction along the North Shore.

CPR logos illustrate the history of corporate identity as a global multi-faceted brand, starting with the beaver shield gnawing on maple leaves, both of which have become national symbols. The Last Spike was driven nearby in 1885.

Immigration history explains a federal agreement with the CPR and CNR to recruit and settle Europeans across the West. The Dominion Land Act in 1872 granted 65 ha of free land to any settler who paid a \$10 registration fee, lived on the land for three years, and built a permanent home.

Prisoner of War camps and four Japanese internment camps were built between Schreiber and Jackfish on the secluded shores of Lake Superior.

The Casques Isles Trail forms part of the Voyageur Hiking Trail along the Schreiber Channel segment.



Rainbow Falls Provincial Park is just 20 minutes west of Terrace Bay. The park has a beautiful sandy beach.

 Nipigon. The last G7 easel site on the route from Sault Ste. Marie. Climb the 20m Bridgeview Lookout Tower with a 360 degree view of the Nipigon River that once produced the largest brook trout for fly fishing in the world. Visit the Heritage Museum and take a self-guided walking tour to learn about the history of the town.

Travel from Nipigon to Thunder Bay.



Ouimet Canyon Provincial Park. Panoramic views of a 150-metre wide gorge and sheer cliffs that drop 100 metres straight down to the canyon floor. A trail and boardwalk connects two lookout platforms with spectacular views of the canyon.



Sleeping Giant Provincial Park offers spectacular views of the 'Sleeping Giant" from the tip of Sibley Peninsula.

- The Terry Fox Memorial and Scenic Lookout has a 9-foot statue erected in memory of Terry Fox, the courageous one-legged runner who embarked on a 5,300 kilometre run across Canada to raise money for cancer research. His unique hop-and-skip style inspired Canadians to support his Marathon of Hope that has grown world-wide.
- The city of Thunder Bay is named after a large bay at the head of Lake Superior. The bay's name refers to the legendary Thunderbird, a mythical giant bird of Ojibwe folklore. The city has grown into a major transportation hub with an inland port served by two transcontinental railroads delivering grain from the Prairies. Visit the developed harbor front for a choice of fine restaurants.
- Navigate the vast universe of galaxies, star clusters and planets through a Corrected DALL-Kirkham Telescope at the David Thompson Astronomical Observatory. Named in honor of David Thompson who mapped over four million square kilometers of North America as a fur trader, surveyor and cartographer for the North West Company. Stay at the RV campground and partake in a Star Walk Experience and night sky navigation.
- Fort William Historical Park, the world's largest Fur Trade Post at its time. It is an exact replica of the North West Company's inland headquarters. Fur traders would bring their goods from the far west for trading, and the voyageurs would then haul bales of beaver pelts all the way to Montreal for shipment to Europe. Meet costumed Scottish fur traders, French voyageurs and the Ojibwe who toil at the fort.



Kakabeka Falls Provincial Park. A 40-meter waterfall that required a portage on the historic canoe route connecting Lake Superior with Lake of the Woods.



B DAY EIGHT

Travel from Thunder Bay to Fort Frances.

Sunset Country. A vast area in Northwest Ontario with 150,000 lakes bound by the Boreal forest.



Quetico Provincial Park – Turn off on Hwy#11 (148 km west of Thunder Bay). A major wilderness park recognized as one of the world's premier paddling destinations. Park headquarters are located in the town of Atikokan.

- **Atikokan.** The Centennial Museum and Historic Park describes the Steep Rock mine discovery in 1938, its opening in 1944 to extract iron ore from a giant pit, and its ultimate demise in 1974. Four massive electric dredges were used to remove 270 million cubic yards of dirt from the lake to access the ore body. Iron pellets were shipped by ore carriers across the Great Lakes to steel mills in Hamilton and Pittsburgh.
- Fort Frances. A border town where the Rainy River bridge crosses the Canada/U.S. border to International Falls, Minnesota. Follow the La Verendrye Parkway along the shores of Rainy River as it flows 129 kms west out of Rainy Lake to Lake of the Woods. Historic plaques describe the *Voyageurs Highway* and the rivalry between the Hudson Bay and Northwest Trading Company for furs along the canoe route. A description at the base of a 100-foot forest fire lookout tells of the early-warning radar bases that dotted the north during the Cold War. A shuttered pulp mill on the Canadian side is a reminder of the boom and bust times in the region.



 Kay-Nah-Chi-Wah-Nung Historical Centre*. Continue along Hwy#11 past the junction with #71 to Kay-Nah-Chi-Wah-Nung Historical Centre, meaning the Place of Long Rapids. The site features the largest group of Indigenous burial mounds in Canada that reflect more than 8,000 years of reoccurring habitation. Some mounds are more than 7 meters in height. The Travel Information Centre has limited hours of operation.

Travel from Fort Frances to Kenora.

The southern route on Hwy#11 through Quetico Provincial Park and Kay-Nah-Chi-Wah-Nung Historical Centre is the preferred route to Lake of the Woods.

Lake of the Woods. Once known as the King's Highway, Hwy#71 is one of the most spectacular 200 km stretches of remote highway in Ontario. Meander northward through Caliper Lake Provincial Park, Nestor Falls, Sioux Narrows and Rushing River Provincial Park located along the east shore of beautiful Lake of the Woods. Look for private campgrounds along the lake shore.

Caliper Lake Provincial Park. Located one hour north of Fort Frances. A campground is situated on a bluff overlooking Caliper Lake from a stand of old growth red and white pine. The park features a large beach with a sectioned off swimming area. Services: Electrical. Showers/flush toilets. Laundry. Hiking trails. Canoe Rentals. Open seasonally.

 Sioux Narrows / Nestor Falls. One town separated by 50 kilometers of boreal forest lined roads that wind along the eastern shores of Lake of the Woods. Nestor Falls often attracts flocks of Pelicans that feed in the fish spawning beds at the base of the falls. The Northern Ontario Sport Fishing centre, which highlights the historical and biological perspectives of the world class fresh water fisheries on Lake of the Woods. The Sport Fishing Centre also serves as the hub for visitor information in Sioux Narrows.



Sioux Narrows Provincial Park.

Located just off Hwy#71 on the shores of Lake of the Woods, this park offers recreation opportunities for the lake lover – boating, swimming, sailing and canoeing. Services: Electrical. Showers/flush toilets. Laundry.



Rushing River Provincial Park. Located 25 kms south of Kenora. White water rapids give name to the river that drains Dogtooth Lake. Services: Electrical. Showers/ toilets. Laundry. Kayak rentals. Hiking trails.

• Kenora. Once known as "Rat Portage" after trapping muskrats where the voyageur canoe route once bypassed the rapids at the outlet to the Winnipeg River. Visit the Lake of the Woods Museum nicely situated in downtown on the shores of Lake of the Woods.

• The museum explains the fur trade, native culture, mining and railroad history. It contains a replica of a birch bark canoe used by Indigenous people to gather wild rice, and examples of beaded buck-skin jackets and moccasins made from animals trapped in the region. Enjoy a relaxing cruise around the Lake of the Woods on the *M.S. Kenora* to view multi-milliondollar homes and cottages owned by celebrities from around the world. Depart from the wharf at the Matiowski Farmer's Market. The Lake of the Woods **Discovery Centre** features an interpretive forest with different woods used by First Nations people.





Travel from Thunder Bay to Ignace.



Kakabeka Falls Provincial Park. The "Mountain Portage"* around Kakabeka Falls was a link connecting Lake Superior to Lake of the Woods and the Winnipeg River. Follow the boardwalk along the riverside cliffs. The Interpretive Centre features a fur trade documentary "Hinge of an Empire".

Central Standard Time Zone. A marker at Latitude 90 near Raith commemorates Sir Standford Fleming and the adoption of standard time as a world-wide concept for reckoning uniform time.



Wabakimi Provincial Park Park. Lies straight north of Thunder Bay towards Armstrong. The park is only accessible by plane, train or canoe. It is Ontario's second largest provincial park, and one of the world's largest boreal forest reserves. Guided eco-tours by canoe and float plane provide customplanned insights into the landscape, geology, glacial history and woodland caribou habitat. VIA Rail skirts the south end of the Park. Purchase permits and licenses at the Wabakimi Provincial Park office in Thunder Bay. For more information on this park, visit ontarioparks.com/park/wabakimi.



Ignace. The downtown travel Information centre and regional museum displays nine themes about development in the north. Panels explain the location of the town located in the transition zone between the southerly mixed Great Lakes Forest and the huge expanse of coniferous Boreal Forest. An outdoor display includes an historic 100 ft fire lookout tower, it was one of three hundred erected in the north as a means of early fire detection. It tells of the glory days of the towermen who were isolated for months during fire season at these commanding sentinels. Most of the towers were dismantled and replaced by aerial surveillance.

Thunder Bay

The Ignace area is being explored for finding a suitable deep geological repository for the long-term management of Canada's nuclear fuel. Visit the Learn More Centre hosted by the Ignace Community Nuclear Liaison Committee. The sensitive issue has divided many communities throughout the North.

Embark on adventurous day-trip by boat to explore the legend of White Otter Castle, where a lonesome logger single-handedly built a square-log homestead on a remote island in hopes he would attract a bride who never came.

Sandbar Lake Provincial Park. Just north of Ignace off Hwy#599. Features a beautiful soft sand beach with shallow water. Services: Electrical. Showers.



Young Lake Lodge. 50 minutes north of Ignace off Hwy#599 just north of Silver Dollar. Limited space. Lake front parking. No RV services available.

Route – 270 km Follow Hwy#599 north from Ignace to Silver Dollar. Join Hwy#642, to Sioux Lookout, or continue north on Hwy#599 to Savant Lake, and take Hwy#516 to Sioux Lookout.

DAY TWO - IGNACE TO SIOUX LOOKOUT

2 DAY TWO

Travel from Ignace to Sioux Lookout.

- Silver Dollar. An inspiring name for a hamlet with a gas station at the junction of Hwy#599 and #642. Hwy#599 continues 230 km north to "the official end of the road" at Pickle Lake, where the all-season pavement ends and the ice roads begin. It lays claim to be one of the busiest airports in Canada dedicated to serving 17 remote northern First Nations communities. An 1,800 km power transmission line delivers 230 kV to replace diesel generators. The second phase includes 2,100 steel towers to connect to the provincial power grid. The town was founded as a transportation hub during the gold rush.
- Sioux Lookout. The "Hub of the North" lies on the English River system that drains into the Winnipeg River. As a legend from the 1700s, the town's name originated when a glint of sunlight on a paddle seen from the lookout served as a warning of a Sioux war party approaching an Objibway encampment. The intruders were ambushed with bows and arrows and slaughtered in the surprise attack. The float plane base serves lodges and bush camps throughout the region.

The town served as a railway divisional point for the CNR until diesel power replaced steam locomotives. Only the station remains, and now serves as the town museum. The airport is a major hub with scheduled flights to First Nation communities in the far north. An USAF radar base served as part of the Pine Tree Line during the Cold War.

Abram Lake Resort & RV Park. Sioux Lookout. 4 km from Sioux Lookout on Hwy#72. Waterfront. Sandy beach. Services: Pull-thru sites. Several electric/water sites. Laundromat. Boat rentals.



Objibway Provincial Park. 25 km south Sioux Lookout on Hwy#72, half way to Dinorwic on Hwy#17. Situated on Little Vermillion Lake. Services: Showers. Vault toilets. Sani dump.



Aaron Provincial Park. Hwy#17, east of Dryden. 80 km/1 hour drive from Sioux Lookout. Small beach on a shallow lake. Services: Showers. Comfort station. Sani-dump.



Route – 300 km Take Hwy#664 for a scenic route through Hudson back to Hwy#72. Or follow Hwy#72 south from Sioux Lookout to Dinorwic on Hwy#17. Follow Hwy#17 west to Vermillion Bay. Connect to Hwy#105 north to Red Lake.

3 DAY THREE

Travel from Sioux Lookout to Red Lake.

Travel west from Sioux Lookout through Dryden to Vermillion Bay where the Hwy#105 Corridor takes off north to Red Lake.

- Hudson is a village on the shores of Lac Suel. It is an important float plane base to service fly-in fish camps. It is home port for a fleet of houseboats, otherwise called Lac Suel "floating lodges".
- Minnitaki. Make a roadside stop at Egli's Sheep Farm to purchase from a selection of woolen clothing. Ask for "Winnipeg garbage mitts" with extra liners.
- Vermillion Bay. Take-off point north to the Hwy#105 Corridor, referred to as the Red Lake Highway. The 175 km drive starts at Moose Creek Trading, which offers a large selection of local crafts and gifts. It is best to fuel up before heading north.
- Perrault Falls. Pull off the highway to see a series of waterfalls and rapids below the highway crossing over English River.
- Ear Falls is situated on the shores of Lac Seul with a hydro electric dam at the river outlet on the English and Winnipeg River systems. A historic roadside park displays a model of a NASA rocket used by scientists from around the world to conduct experiments from the Ear Falls launch site during a total eclipse of the sun. The next total eclipse of the sun in the area of the Arctic is not expected until around year 2339.

• Red Lake. Three head frames mark the distinct skyline of highly productive underground gold mines clustered throughout the Red Lake Mining District. Shafts are sunk extremely deep to 9,000 feet. Gold ore is converted to bullion at the processing facilities, with estimated reserves of 3 million ounces of gold. Active mines are also located nearby in Cochenour, Balmerstown and Madsen.

The Red Lake Regional Heritage Centre displays a lengthy timeline showing the important historic dates of the area. Fur trading, aviation and mining history are interwoven with major events occurring in a larger context of developments across Canada around the same times.

The Norseman Heritage Park, known as the "Norseman Capital of the World" displays the sturdy single-engine bush plane with a descriptive history of use in the north. An annual Norseman Days Festival draws a few of the last remaining operational aircraft from around the world

Thousands of European immigrants and displaced persons have found their way north to work in the mines.

Blue Lake Provincial Park. Vermillion Bay. Just off the Trans Canada Hwy. Services: Showers. Toilets. Laundromat, Electrical, Visitor Centre, Canoe rentals.



Route - 360 km Head south on Hwy#105 from Red Lake back to Hwy#17. Follow Hwy#17 west to Kenora. Two side routes can be explored north of Kenora. Hwy#658 leads to Reddit, and Hwy#596 leads to Minaki. From Kenora, Hwy#17 continues west to the Manitoba border where Hwy#1 leads to West Hawk and Falcon Lakes.

4 DAY FOUR

Travel from Red Lake to Manitoba.



Woodland Caribou Provincial Park is an inter-provincial wilderness park straddling the Ontario/Manitoba border. Hundreds of canoe routes interconnect lakes and are part of the Pimachiowis Aki UNESCO World Heritage Site. Fly-in to back country camps from Red Lake. The Bloodvein River is designated as a Canadian Heritage River that flows 300 km into Lake Winnipeg in Manitoba.

- Reddit. Located north of Kenora off Hwy#658. It marks the end of paved road where it crosses the CNR mainline.
- Ontario to Manitoba. The last stage to the Manitoba border cuts through a wiggly stretch of the Trans Canada Hwy#17 between Vermillion Bay and Kenora. Double lanes are being constructed through "Rock Cut Alley". Provincial Visitor Centres and rest areas are located on each side of the border.

Rest stops are well-marked between Thunder Bay and the Manitoba border. Take a break at West Hawk and Falcon Lakes beaches off Hwy#1 in the Whiteshell region before reaching the flat out prairies.



Route options: Travellers can choose to loop back along the Fur Trade Route or the Prospector Route towards Southern Ontario, or continue westward to Manitoba

DAY ONE

Travel from Toronto to Huntsville.

Head north on Hwy#400 towards Barrie until it branches into Hwy#11 to Orillia. The Great Canadian Shield comes into view as the mosaic of an expansive deciduous and coniferous forest unfolds.

- Bracebridge is located in the heart of the Muskoka Lakes region and known as "Halfway to the North Pole" where it lays equidistant from the equator and North Pole. The town overlooks the dam and waterfalls near the rail crossing. Antique and fashion shops line the main street.
- Huntsville. Muskoka Heritage Place overlooking Cann Lake, records the living history of homesteads and First Nations encampments. The Portage Flyer, a restored steam train, runs 2 km alongside the Muskoka River and is reputed to be the shortest operational railroad in the world.



Algonquin Provincial Park. East of Huntsville, Algonquin Provincial Park occupies 7,700 square kilometres of stunning wilderness landscapes at the outer edge of the Canadian Shield. Protected since 1893 as Ontario's first Provincial Park, it remains an iconic destination for travelers from around the world.

Travel from Hunstville to Temagami.

- North Bay. Visit the harbour front in North Bay, known as "The Gateway to the North". Take a break to enjoy a five hour cruise aboard the Chief Commanda II from Lake Nipissing to French River. A vintage Wonderland Carousel and a miniature train are heritage features near the municipal marina. Observe a large switching yard for the Ottawa Valley Railroad.
- The Temagami region is famous for some of the finest protected old growth white pine forests in eastern Canada.



Marten River Provincial Park. See remnant stands of massive pines including a 350 year old White Pine as you walk the Transition Trail. A replica 19th century logging camp brings a bygone era to life. Relax at one of the park's three beaches.



Finlayson Point Provincial Park is a peninsula in the island-dotted waters of Lake Temagami, part of thousands of kilometres of ancient pine shoreline. Swim at sandy beaches and dive in the deep clear water of Lake Temagami. Hike to Caribou Mountain lookout and fire tower, with views over the White Bear Forest, Lake Temagami and the town of Temagami.

Travel from Temagami to Temiskaming Shores.

Latchford is a small lumbering town on Bay Lake and is marked by a dam close to the highway bridge over the Montreal River. It is renowned for having the world's shortest covered bridge.



Cobalt. The entire town of Cobalt* is a national historic site paying tribute to the discovery of silver in 1903. Cobalt is the birthplace of hard rock mining in Canada, and known for the world's first mining camp. The region's rich veins triggered a mining boom which attracted international attention to Canada's emergence as the silver capital of the world. Open cuts carved from the rock by hand reflect the earliest surface mining operations. Mine shafts were sunk, and headframes were built above the ore body. Massive rock piles are remnants of ore processing on site. Visit the Cobalt Mining Museum and follow the Heritage Silver Trail, a self-guided driving tour through back roads of the Cobalt mine. The tour features 20 sites with interpretive plaques. Take the Colonial Adit Mine Tour to see hand carved tunnels from the early mining days.



Route - 140 km Continue north on Hwy#11 to Latchford. Turn east onto Hwy#11B just north of Latchford to Cobalt. Loop back to Hwy#11 by following Hwy#11B through North Cobalt, Haileybury, and back towards New Liskeard along the shores of Lake Temiskaming.

3 DAY THREE - TEMAGAMI TO TEMISKAMING SHORES

Temiskaming Shores. The resort community of Temiskaming Shores on the Wabi River where it enters Lake Temiskaming is an amalgamation of the three former municipalities of New Liskeard, Haileybury and rural area of Dymond.

Bucke Park Campground. Located on the shores of Lake Temiskaming. Hike the trail to Devils Rock for spectacular views of Lake Temiskaming.

Kap-Kig-Iwan Provincial Park. Located 30 minutes north of Temiskaming Shores, just 2 km south of Englehart off Hwy#11. Spectacular lookout over the Englehart River that roars through whitewater rapids.

Travel from Temiskaming Shores to Iroquois Falls.

- Kirkland Lake is another city that owes its rich existence to gold mining. The "Kirkland Lake Mile of Gold" was named after seven major mines located virtually in the town. Visit the Museum of Northern History* in Kirkland Lake housed in a chateau-style mansion built by Sir Harry Oakes that celebrates the town's cultural heritage. Visit the historic Toburn Gold Mine which was the first mine in the area and produced 42 million ounces of gold. Wander the main street as it weaves past historic buildings. The city celebrates its 100-year centenary in 2020.
- Iroquois Falls was built as a company town on the Abitibi River, but has turned to tourism after closure of the newsprint mill. It is known as "The Garden Town of the North" where the community takes great pride in flowers and vegetable gardens. Visit Anson Park to view the Shay 70 Locomotive that used to operate through town, or take a tour of the Pioneer Museum to find out how Iroquois Falls came to be.



Route - 170 km Continue north on Hwy#11. Take a right on Hwy#624, just before Englehart. Turn left at Hwy#66 to Kirkland Lake. Continue west on Hwy#66 back to Hwy#11. Continue north on Hwy#11, and exit on Hwy#67 to Iroquois Falls.





DAY FIVE

Travel from Iroquois Falls to Timmins.

• Timmins. The story of Timmins begins in 1909 with the Porcupine Gold Rush. By 2011, the Porcupine Camp had mined over 70 million ounces of gold, compared to the 12 million ounces produced during the well-known Klondike Gold Rush. From the discovery of gold and other precious metals such as nickel, copper, zinc, silver and diamonds, history seems to repeat itself and the city with a heart of gold continues to reap the benefits of this exploration fever. Mine artifacts, buildings and a collection of seven life sized statues depicting miners in various work related poses can be found throughout the city of Timmins.

Stop by the Timmins Museum National Exhibition Center for a glimpse into the past and discover the history behind how Timmins has received worldwide recognition as a major player in global mining. Take a tour of the Hollinger House and get a feel for what life was like in the 30s.

Directly across from the Timmins Museum is a lookout of a live operating open pit Gold Mine. Visitors can time their visit accordingly to safely experience the rumble of live blasting twice per day.

• Cochrane can be said to be Wonderfully Unexpected. This 24-acre Polar Bear Habitat for rescued polar bears includes a lake enclosure to replicate their natural surroundings. Visitors to the town are greeted by a large polar bear statue named Chimo, an Inuit greeting. The Interpretive Centre explains the vast range and life cycle habits of these nomadic bears around the Polar Circle. Cochrane Heritage Village has multiple replica buildings, including a butcher shop, hardware store, school house and trapper's cabin.



The Vintage Snowmobile Museum traces the development of snowmobiles used for industrial development and recreation throughout the North, including sledder clubs and protective clothing. The Tim Horton Museum pays tribute to their home town hockey hero who founded Tim's coffee and doughnut franchises.

The town serves as the southern terminus of the Polar Bear Express to Moosonee, with a vintage steam engine and passenger cars located beside the train station.

WildExodus - Wawaitin Holiday Park. Located 30 minutes south west of Timmins on Kenogamissi Lake. A Canadian Signature Experience for glamping, guided canoeing, and nature hikes and native burial grounds. Imagine exquisite dining and room service in a custom-built prospector tent offered in the two-night package. Services: RV sites available. Electrical. Sani-dump. Hiking. Canoe rentals. Travel packages.



Kettle Lakes Provincial Park. Located just off Hwy#101 west of Matheson. The park features 22 deep spring- fed kettle lakes created by glaciers. Services: Electrical. Laundry. Showers / flush toilets. Park store. Canoe rentals. Hiking and biking trails through jack pine forest. Interpretive programs.

The James Bay Coast © ONE DAY RETURN TRIP / 2-DAY STAY / 3-DAY STAY COCHRANE TO MOOSONEE: 5 HOURS

Take the Polar Bear Express for a wilderness adventure in the far north.

Plan to take the Ontario Northland Railway from Cochrane located at the northern turning point on the TCH #11 about 800 km due north from Toronto, to the ONL terminus in Moosonee.

JAMES BAY

The Polar Bear Express passenger rail service runs five days per week during the summer season, so it takes some planning to make the journey work. An extra day is needed to venture farther north to the mouth of James Bay, or cross to Moose Factory to visit national historic sites, depending on tides and weather conditions.

The train arrives in the afternoon with an evening departure. The journey takes five hours each way across the Canadian Shield and the Hudson Bay Lowlands.

Be aware that restaurants are virtually nonexistent with reliance on B&Bs or the Super 8 Hotel in Moosonee. Travellers must depend on the microwave in the hotel room to whip up a wide selection of frozen meals from the National superstore nearby. Bananas can be purchased next to an all terrain bush buggy.

Cree Village Eco-Lodge offers simply furnished rooms on the waterfront in Moose Factory.

ONL provides free parking for RVs next to the rail station in Cochrane for up to four days. The station also offers accommodation and a cafe. There are no summer roads to James Bay.

There are several options for length of stay in Moosonee and Moose Factory.

ONE DAY RETURN TRIP

The easiest choice is to make a one-day roundtrip from Cochrane to Moosonee, but doesn't provide enough time to see the sites. A taxi will bring visitors to the town wharf and a boat ride to the island, but that is about all in the five hour turnaround at the northern terminus.

2-DAY STAY

One night will allow enough time to either visit the outer reaches of the river mouth, or to visit the Hudson's Bay Company's Moose Factory buildings*. Winds and tide will determine whether there is enough time to visit James Bay.

3-DAY STAY

The best option is to stay two nights to provide sufficient time to reach the Bay and visit the island. This must tie into the rail schedule. For example, depart Cochrane on a Monday and return on Wednesday. Travellers need to be flexible with the river tides to book an experienced river guide for the 20 km boat trip on the Moose River to the mouth of James Bay.













• Cree Cultural Interpretive Centre provides native teachings and a collection of traditional clothing, cradle boards, hunting tools and a gift store showcasing genuine locally made crafts and leather goods hand made from deer and moose hides.

As one of the HBCs first trading posts, brigantines would sail through Hudson Bay to James Bay and then anchor off the island shore for loading baled furs in exchange for utensils, ammunition and beads.

- Weeneebayko General Hospital, located on the Moose Factory side, requires an ambulance boat to transport the needy arriving by air from northern communities. The hospital is affiliated with Queens University in Kingston. Land has been assembled to build a new state-of-the-art hospital on the mainland at Moosonee.
- Moose Factory* was founded in 1673 and is the second oldest HBC trading post. It later had ship building and a full time bishop. With decline of the fur trade, the town transformed from a company town to a permanent settlement serving the North.
- St. Thomas Church was built in 1864 under direction of the Hudson's Bay Company and has been restored through efforts of parishioners. The Centennial Museum Park includes the Staff House and half-storied frame buildings and cemetery.

Fur prices were set in terms of the number of hides required for an item. A brass kettle was traded for one beaver pelt, and a blanket for six beaver. The length of a musket determined the number of beaver pelts in a bale for shipment to England.

6 DAY SIX

Travel back south from Timmins to Killarney Provincial Park.

- Gogama. This small northern community is home to several great fishing lodges. Learn about legendary Joe LaFlamme who trained wolves to pull a dogsled in the wilds of Northern Ontario.
- Sudbury where the Super Stack looms on the horizon. Visit Dynamic Earth to experience the life of rock miners complete with the sounds of blasting and ore drills. Visit Science North, one of the largest science centres in all of Canada, featuring a fun, interactive approach to science education and an IMAX® theatre.
- Killarney. Head south on Hwy#69 through pink granite rock cuts to the junction of Hwy#637 where the highway dips down to the waterfront in Killarney. Take a short hike to the Killarney East Lighthouse. It was here when the first settlers arrived in 1820 to establish a fur trading post where two lighthouses were the first to operate after Confederation. The Village of Killarney provides services including a Laundromat, marina and museum.



Killarney Provincial Park is classified as a wilderness park where rugged, white granite cliffs overlook Georgian Bay. Killarney Provincial Park is recognized as a nationally certified Dark Sky Preserve by the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada.

Where to camp near Killarney.





Killarney to Toronto.

French River Provincial Park*. A Travel Information Centre and museum at the National Historic Site on the French River pays tribute to the Lake Nipissing Canoe Route. Voyageurs followed the river west to secure furs from the Objibwe on a voyage of trade and exploration leading north and west of Lake Superior as early as 1659. The French River, although relatively small, was most significant in providing access to westward travel. The Travel Information Center is open Thursday to Monday in spring and fall, and daily in the summer.

- Services: Backcountry camping only No RV camping available at this site. Flush toilets. Park Store (seasonal), Travel Information Centre. Hiking trails.
- Parry Sound. Make a short stop at the harbour front community of Parry Sound and nearby lookout tower on Georgian Bay. Visit the Interpretive Centre featuring the canoe route that served as a commercial waterway for 250 years.

Returning to RV rental stations. It is best to stay reasonably close to the rental stations in the Toronto area on your last night. Clean-up, empty holding tanks, and refuel before dropoff. Be ready to vacate the vehicle upon arrival at the station.



COCHRANE TO NIPIGON

OPTIONAL CONNECTING ROUTE.

Continue northwest from Cochrane to Nipigon to connect to The Fur Trade Route.

Travel through remote northern wilderness along Hwy#11 where rivers and streams flow north into the frigid Arctic waters of Hudson's Bay.

This extension of The Prospector Route runs 700 km along Ontario's most northerly Trans Canada highway between Cochrane and Nipigon. Miles of muskeg and black spruce are evidence of wilderness where moose abound. The history of the fur trade, lumbering, mining and railroads highlights the remoteness and ruggedness of survival in the Canadian north. Francophone communities are spread across the North as far as Hearst and throughout most of Algoma Country. Hwy#11 parallels the original route of the transcontinental railway between Longlac and Kapuskasing.



Route – 180 km Head west on Hwy#11 to Smooth Rock Falls. Exit north on Hwy#581 in Moonbeam to visit René Brunelle Provincial Park. Continue west on Hwy#11 from Moonbeam to Kapuskasing. Continue west on Hwy#11 to complete the day in Mattice.

Travel from Cochrane to Mattice.

- Smooth Rock Falls. Another once-booming pulp mill town gone bust, its future is being rejuvenated by selling town lots and offering tax breaks on new construction. The town is situation on the shore of the Mattagami River.
- Moonbeam. Known for a replica of an unidentified flying object, the village has claimed the alien mascot in the form of a flying saucer situated along-side the highway. UFO sightings were common in the 1960's. Another myth suggests the name started when early pioneers allegedly reported pillars of light streaming from the sky, which could have been northern lights, or the headlamp of a steam locomotive pounding through the winter darkness. The town serves as an access point to René Brunelle Provincial Park.



René Brunelle Provincial Park. Located just 15 minutes outside of Moonbeam on Hwy#581. The park features four beautiful sandy beaches on Remi Lake, which served as a float plane base for many years. The park offers two great hiking trails, one which tells of a 1922 bush pilot plane crash. Motorboat, canoe, kayak and bike rentals are available at this park. Services: Electrical. Laundry. Showers / flush toilets. Park store. Canoe rentals.

- Kapuskasing. Ron Morel Memorial Museum is housed in two heritage passenger day coaches next to the train station. The town is notorious for providing the largest POW camp in Canada during WWI. No one dared escape into isolated surroundings at 40 below zero. A pulp mill is the mainstay of the community. The town is featured in "Kapuskasing Coffee" by Canadian singer-songwriter Justin Rutlege.
- Mattice. Flowing from Mattice to Moosonee, the Missinaibi River drops 40 m where it crosses the divide between Precambrian bedrock and Hudson Bay Low Lands at Thunder Falls and Hells Gate Canyon. The Missinaibi is one of the longest free-flowing rivers in Ontario. Townsfolk provide canoes and supplies where paddlers can set off to explore the famous waterway to James Bay. A voyageur statue stands as a symbol to an extended wilderness canoe route to the North.

Where to camp near Mattice.

Twin Lakes Camping. Located off of Hwy 11 and just north of Moonbeam on Hwy 583. Water park on a sandy beach. Services: Full service sites with mobile sani.

There are numerous Provincial Parks along this route that have campsites available. Open seasonally.

GREENSTONE

is an amalgamation of remote mining and forestry towns including Longlac, Geraldton and Beardmore running along Hwy#11. Prevalence of fur trade history and landmarks north of Lake Superior. Hike the 8 km Lake Nipigon Shoreline Trail to two viewing platforms overlooking the lake. Poplar Lodge Park is a fullservice municipal campground on the lake.



2 DAY TWO

Travel from Hearst to Nipigon.

• Hearst is home to many settlers from Quebec who were encouraged by parish priests to emigrate west to Northern Ontario as an opportunity where large tracts of undeveloped land were still available. For the priests, it meant the spread of Catholicism to new frontiers. The town proclaims to be the "Moose Capital of Canada". The town's Visitor Centre features wildlife displays. The Heritage Sawmill Marketplace is a tribute to the hay day lumber industry.



Fushimi Lake Provincial Park. Located northwest of Hearst. This provincial park completely surrounds the shoreline of Fushimi Lake. Two great hiking trails; one trail leads to a fire tower. Services: Showers/flush toilets. Laundromat. Sani-dump. Park store. Hiking on the Archilles and Fire Tower Trails.




- Longlac. Named for a very long lake. Two historic tug boats sit alongside the Tourist Information Centre and describe the role of marine capability for towing log booms to sawmills on Lake Nipigon, reputed by local residents to be the fifth Great Lake. A canoe mounted on a pillar signifies the arrival of the coureurs des bois during the fur trade era.
- Geraldton. The Geraldton Interpretive Centre describes history of the fur trade and mining activity in the region. Close to MacLeod Provincial Park.



MacLeod Provincial Park. Off Hwy#11 and 10 km east of Geraldton. Named after an abandoned gold mine that sits on a peninsula jutting out into Kenogamisis Lake. The park offers excellent swimming and fishing for walleye and pike.

Services: Electrical sites. Showers/flush toilets. Sani-dump.



- Beardmore. After making claim that it assumed the title of "Snow Capital of the World", the sparsely populated mining and lumber town decided to celebrate its status by building a white wooden structure professing to be the world's largest snowman. The 10 m statue is appropriately attired for the various seasons. The giant model of a Sasquatch at the Big Foot Motel leaves another lasting impression of the wilderness.
- Bingwi Neyaashi Anishnaabek, also known as BNA, was previously Sand Point First Nation. The fishing village sits a short distance off Hwy#11 on the south eastern shore of Lake Nipigon. Drive past an Indigenous burial ground with wildlife symbols as headstones. Watch for stunning views of knob hills and palisades east of Greenstone.
- Orient Bay Palisades features a 10 km hiking trail to one of the highest elevations in Ontario, with four lookouts spread out along the ridge of imposing cliffs over-looking Orient Bay at the southernmost point of Lake Nipigon. Steep rugged terrain makes this a challenging hike. There are no railings or barriers at any of the lookouts.
- Pitawabik Palisades are protected by Ontario's Living Legend Project in the Nipigon Basin. The palisades are world-renowned as the one the top three ice-climbing destinations in North America with 110 waterfalls higher than 40 m and freezing up to 10 m thick.

- Helen Lake. St. Sylvester Mission Church just north of Helen Lake community, stands in memory of the Jesuits who established the mission in 1852. Located as a rest stop on the historic fur trade route.
- Nipigon Canoe Route historic site*. A scenic rest area alongside the lake describes a water route for travel between Lake Superior and James Bay. During the fur trade era, the Nipigon route became an area of intense rivalry between English traders on Hudson Bay, and French and Scottish traders based on the St. Lawrence River.



Join the Fur Trade Route at the bridge crossing of the Nipigon River, towards the Bridgeview Lookout Tower on the way into Nipigon (see pages 98-99).



HALIBURTON HIGHLANDS & OTTAWA VALLEY

This route can be driven in two or three days. Take an extra day to enjoy the waterways.

A vast travel network of lakes and rivers were used by explorers, traders, missionaries, settlers, and now by recreational users as primary access to the back country. The Ottawa River is one of Canada's longest rivers fed by tributaries flowing from the Algonquin Highlands, and the Laurentian Mountains on the Quebec side. Foremost among them is the Madawaska River - with the middle section commonly referred to as the 'Middle Mad" between Bark and Kamaniskeg Lakes - which drains 230 km from Algonquin Provincial Park into the Ottawa River.

Safety considerations for the Ottawa River Canoe Routes

Refer to *Paddle Routes in the Ottawa Valley (2)* for further details. This route takes 3 days as part of a more extensive touring route. It provides contacts for whitewater rafting, kayaking and canoeing, with water safety foremost in mind.

The maze of rivers, channels and islands provide a huge playground for whitewater enthusiasts. Rapids are rated from 1-5, with easy to most difficult. Practice water safety. Rapids are for experienced paddlers only. Boating regulations require a Personal Flotation Device (PFD) for each person, a throw rope and extra paddle on board.

1 DAY ONE

Travel from Hunstville to Algonquin Provincial Park.

 Huntsville is located in the heart of Muskoka's cottage country. The Muskoka Heritage Park offers a Pioneer Village with costumed interpreters going about their daily chores. Stop in at the Steam Museum to learn the history of steam transportation in the Muskokas and Algonquin. Climb aboard an open-air carriage pulled by the steam-driven *Portage Flyer*. A historic Swing Bridge is an iconic landmark at the entrance to downtown. Group of 7 murals adorn many buildings.

A short side-trip to Dorset takes in the 30m Scenic Lookout Tower with an observation deck spanning the surrounding view. A hill top museum contains a history of forest fire spotting in the boreal forest.



Algonquin Provincial Park is Ontario's oldest and most famous park, designated in 1893. Hwy#60 runs through Algonquin Provincial Park in the southwestern corner starting at the West Gate between Dwight and Whitney. The 7,630 square km park is the headwaters of five major rivers that contribute to an extensive network of canoe routes. The Canoe Lake Store offers full and half-day guided canoe tours and an extensive collection of park merchandise.

Route – 42 km Travel east on Hwy#60 from

Travel east on Hwy#60 from Huntsville to the southern tip of Algonquin Provincial Park. **Side trip to Dorset:** 15-minutes south of Dwight. Follow Hwy#35 just southeast of Dwight to Dorset.

The Visitor Centre at km 43 has a viewing deck, exhibits, Nature Store and Bookshop, theatre and art room. The Logging Museum has an interactive interpretive trail with a log dam and chute that once moved large white pine logs to mills down-stream on the rivers. The Discovery Program publishes *This Week in Algonquin* newsletter that provides dates, times and locations of special events and interpretive activities. Look for it at gates, campground offices, museums and online. The best time to see moose is in the spring at the side of the highway at dawn or dusk, and to see beaver in fall when they repair dams and stock their winter food supply. Black bears are plentiful in the park.

The park offers plenty of trails, including the Old Railway Bike Trail, a multi-use/bike trail that follows an old railway bed along the Highway 60 Corridor. Railways were built in the 1890s to haul hardwood logs that could not be floated to sawmills. Other lines connected to haul lumber to markets through Renfrew and Ottawa.

Algonquin Provincial Park. Entry to southern section on Hwy#60 through West or East Gate. Numerous campgrounds with electric and water hookups.

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DAY TWO

Travel from Algonquin Provincial Park to Barry's Bay.

- Whitney. Located at an outflow on the Madawaska River just outside the park, and leads to a drop-in for kayaks to make a 22 km run on the Madawaska River.
- Madawaska Basin. The Upper Madawaska Basin, located 14 km west of Barry's Bay, is famous for a 50 km network of recreation trails around spectacular lakes. There is access from four trail heads to numerous viewpoints overlooking Bear Lake. Trail names are designated to reflect geologic features or animals observed along the route. Use trails at own risk.
- Barry's Bay is the center of the waterway route in the Madawaska Valley. The Middle Mad is famous for rafting, kayak and canoe programs, thanks to mid-week whitewater releases from the Bark Lake Dam.

A one guarter scale replica of the Canadian built CF 105 Avro Arrow is mounted in the community park to honor Jan Zurakowski, a local resident and the chief test pilot of the supersonic jet interceptor that was instrumental in the advancement of aviation technology during the late 1950s. A display explains the daring Zurabatic Cartwheel that he introduced to acrobatic flying. Warsaw Polish Monument, located between Barry's Bay and Combermere, was built by the Polish Canadian community in remembrance of 10,000 Polish scouts in the Underground Resistance who were killed during the Warsaw Uprising

Route - 90 km

Continue east on Hwy#60 from Barry's Bay to Eganville. Either follow Hwy#8 east to Cobden, or continue down Hwy#60 to intercept Hwy#17. Follow Hwy#7 from Cobden to Foresters Falls.

DAY THREE

Travel from Barry's Bay to Foresters Falls.

- Wilno. This tiny hamlet is Canada's first Polish settlement. Intricate folk art of Kashubian culture is showcased in the ceramics, along with embroidery and fabrics in the Polish Kashub Heritage Museum. Authentic Polish cuisine is served at the Wilno Tavern. Art and handcrafted products line the walls at the Wilno Craft Gallery.
- Pikwakanagan. The Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation is a progressive community located on the shores of the Bonnechere River. Visitors are welcome at their annual Pow Wow event held the third weekend in August.
- Golden Lake is another paddler's paradise on a chain of lakes as part of Bonnechere River system.
- Eganville, known as the Ordovician Capital of Canada, is located on the Fourth Chute of the Bonnechere River. Guided tours in the Bonnechere Caves are held daily throughout the summer. Visit the Bonnechere Museum now housed in the post office building, dating from 1912. An ultra-modern sculpture identifies the Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church by the Trellis of Grace.
- Cobden. Hwy#60 Corridor intercepts Hwy#17 enroute to Foresters Falls. It was near here that Samuel de Champlain lost his astrolabe when forced to portage around rapids on the Ottawa River. It was found 254 years later by a farm boy clearing land, and is now placed in the Canadian Museum of History.

Route - 30 km

Continue east on Hwy#60 from Barry's Bay to Eganville. Follow Hwy#8 east to Cobden where Hwy#8 intercepts Hwy#17. Follow Hwy#7 from Cobden to Foresters Falls (route map on p. 136).

- Foresters Falls. Continue on Hwy#7 to reach whitewater rafting operations on the Ottawa River and gateway to the Rocher Fendu rapids section on the Main Channel. Thundering rapids and waterfalls reach grade 3-4 rapids at McCoys, Lorne, and the Carburetor in low water, and the Bus Eater during rapid flow. Public access is provided courtesy of OWL Rafting and Whitewater Ontario. The lower section with grade 2 rapids is suitable for beginners and families.
- Ross Museum. Open seasonally between May and September, the Ross Museum tells the settlement story of the early 1800s. Tour the restored and replica buildings and enjoy time in the gardens.
- A.Y. Jackson Trail. A.Y. Jackson, a member of the Group of Seven, painted a great many sketches in the Madawaska Hills. Follow the back roads between Barry's Bay and Eganville to see some of his popular painting sites and vistas.

OWL Rafting. Foresters Falls. A Canadian Signature Experience (CSE). Rafting packages with meals include RV sites with electrical hook up.

Travel west from Pembroke to North Bay.

This 250 km stretch on Hwy#17 connects the Prospector and Fur Trade Routes between Ottawa and North Bay. The Ottawa River Valley skirts the Quebec border accessible by several bridge crossings.

- Connecting route to Ottawa. Travel southeast on Hwy#17 through the Ottawa Valley along the Ottawa River to connect to the Waterway Route in Ottawa. Refer to the map on p. 6-7.
 - Pembroke. Home to the Upper Ottawa Valley Heritage Centre and replica of Samuel de Champlain's astrolabe. The Pembroke Hydro Museum commemorates hydro electric development, and highlights the first street lighting in Pembroke. The annual Old Time Fiddling & Step Dancing Festival is held on Labor Day weekend.
 - Petawawa. Garrison Petawawa hosts a display of armaments at Canada's largest tactical training base. Garrsion Petawawa Military Museums illustrate the military life on base and Canada's military role in past conflicts. Barrack F-16 is designated a Federal Heritage Building due to its association with post War II. Houseboats cluster at the marina on the west bank of the Ottawa River. Close proximity to the east side of Algonquin Provincial Park.




- Chalk River. Home to Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (CNL). Until shutdown of its nuclear reactor in 2018, CNL produced a large share of the world's supply of medical radioisotopes. The Nuclear Powered Demonstration was the first Canadian nuclear powered prototype reactor for the decommissioned CANDU reactor design located in nearby Rolphton.
- Deep River is so-named where the Ottawa River reaches the greatest depth at more than 400 feet. It is home to the Society for the Preservation of Canada's Nuclear Heritage, The Canadian Clock Museum, and is one of the smallest towns to have a symphony orchestra. Visit Lacroix Park where plaques explain how dams on the Upper Ottawa River have eliminated the hazardous rapids where many fur traders drowned.



• Deux-Rivières. Numbered posts designate the geological features along the Brent Crater Trail. The 2 km loop starts from an observation tower that overlooks the 4 km wide meteorite crater.



North Bay. Connect to the Prospector Route at North bay located on the shores of Lake Nipissing (refer to p. 116).



WHERE TO CAMP

Where to camp between Pembroke and North Bay.



Tiny Village-Ottawa River. Next to Hwy #17 at Deep River. 1,000 feet of sandy beach on the Ottawa River. Glamping (tiny cottages and domes), RV and tent sites available. Services: Sewer and water.



Driftwood Provincial Park. Located on #17 north of Deep River. Services: Showers and flush toilets. Laundromat. Electrical sites in Brumm Campground. Canoe rentals to explore the shores of the Ottawa River.



Samuel de Champlain Provincial Park.

A feature park located west of Mattawa on the famous voyageur route to Lake Nipissing. The Mattawa River Visitor Centre and Museum features the cultural history of the voyageur canoe route through the park and Mattawa River valley. Services: Jingwakoki and Babawasse Campgrounds provide electrical sites. Comfort stations with showers and flush toilets. Laundromat.



Meet Clermont Duval and his son Costel at his art gallery in Mattawa, featuring their acrylic and oil paintings with mystical illusions and symmetry portraying the natural beauty of Northern Ontario. The family pair also created a 5.8m wood carving of **Big Joe Mufferaw**, a legendary voyageur and logger who presided over the Ottawa River Valley during the 1800s.

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
